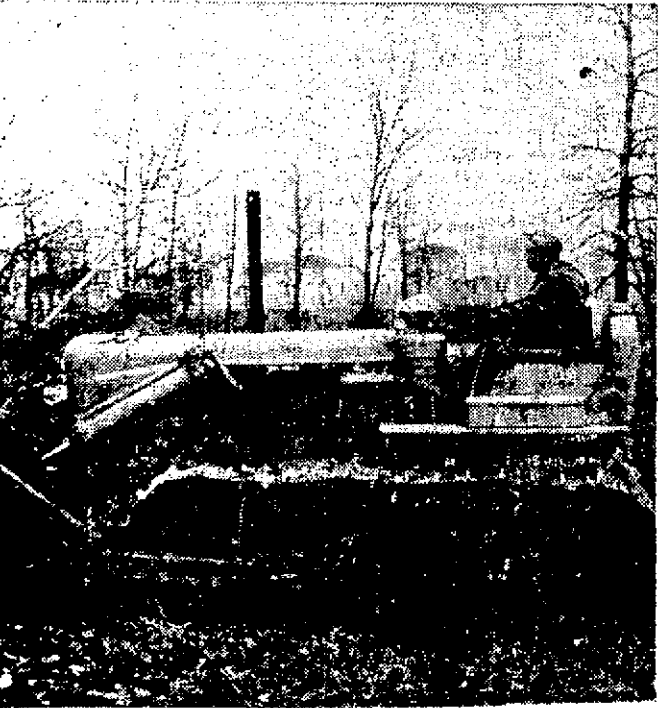

Often the first sign of a new subdivision, this machine is a familiar sight in suburban Winnipeg. In the city too, vacant lots that have been neglected for generations are yielding to the blade of the bulldozer.

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Loyalty Oath For Tenants

NEW YORK (Special-NYHT)—Thirty thousand adult tenants of the 23 federal housing projects in New York must sign loyalty oaths attesting that they are not members of a subversive organization — or face eviction.

Distribution of the printed oath, at the bottom of a copy of the attorney general's list of subversive organizations — both right and left wing — began Thursday morning. The official certificates, together with a notice explaining the reason for the signing, were distributed Wednesday night to the managers of each project by the New York City Housing Authority, in charge of the buildings.

The notice explains that as a tenant of a federally-financed low rent housing project, "you are particularly subject to the federal laws governing housing."

Under the provisions of the Gwinn amendment, the notice continues, the leaseholder "must sign the certificate and return it before June 1 or 'we shall be compelled to start legal action for your removal.'"

This is the second time that the oath has been distributed. On the first occasion in 1953, the oaths were held up by a court injunction.

The measure requiring the oaths was sponsored by Rep. Ralph W. Gwinn, (R., of New York) and passed July 5, 1952. The injunction was granted by Justice M. Henry Martuscello in Brooklyn supreme court, who declared the measure deprived the tenants of "due process of law." His ruling was upset by the appellate division which held that "in the present-day context of world crisis after world crisis, it is our opinion that the danger Congress is seeking to avoid, is infiltration of government housing by subversive elements, justifies the requirement . . ."

Strikes Force U.S. Truck Firms To Shut Down

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A virtual shutdown of major trucking operations in 11 western states, affecting 100,000 workers, was ordered by employers Thursday night after the International Brotherhood of Teamsters (IBT) struck three leading carriers.

Saying "a strike against one is a strike against all," the California Trucking Association ordered all trucks to stop rolling at midnight, but left one small opening for emergency movements.

The association authorized a committee of member carriers to seek permission from teamster unions to transport essential drugs, food and defence materials.
