# A History of Miles MacDonell Collegiate

High School as we know it today was not available until 1915 when the East Kildonan School Board was formed. From 1915 to 1921, anyone from East Kildonan wanting to go beyond Grade 8 had to go outside the area to St. John's Technical School in the Winnipeg School Division. Only a small number of students chose this, as most people at this time did not go to school beyond Grade 8. The East Kildonan School Division paid the tuition of East Kildonan students going outside the area.

In 1921 rising high school enrollments at St. John's eliminated that choice for East Kildonan students, as the Winnipeg School Division wished to reserve all the space for its own students. The East Kildonan Board had to come up with another answer to educate its own high school students. Prince Edward School was expanded in size in 1920 and this allowed space to be given to a small high school of its own East Kildonan Collegiate. The first East Kildonan Collegiate consisted of 41 Grade 9 students only. As the years passed Grade 10 and 11 were added.

The year 1927 saw the move of East Kildonan Collegiate to the second floor of Lord Wolseley School; high school remained there for the next twenty-five years. At the time Grade 12 was first Year University and was first offered in 1931-1932 and three other years, 1944-1945, 1946-1947 and 1949-1950. During the 1930's school space was at such a premium 2 classroom in the Polson School Annex were turned over to East Kildonan Collegiate, as class sizes exceeded 50 students per room. Over those years, staff and students of East Kildonan Collegiate experienced many years of frugal spending by the school board, as little money was available for extras. The restraints imposed by the hard time of the 1930's and later by the demands of World War Two, made the building of a separate school for high school students impossible. The Municipality of East Kildonan itself declared bankruptcy in 1933 and the Province of Manitoba took over most of the authority held by the East Kildonan Council, holding it until the large debt was finally paid off in 1952. During those years and for some years after, the building of schools and other public spending projects required a favourable vote of the ratepayers in an election.

In October 1946 the East Kildonan School Board asked the East Kildonan Municipal Council to set aside land for a new high school on what is now the grounds of the Bronx Park Community Club. East Kildonan’s Municipal Engineer recommended a site adjoining Neil Avenue between Henderson Highway and Brazier. March 1947 saw the present site of Miles Mac set aside by the East Kildonan Council as a site for a future junior high and elementary school. Another potential site looked at for a new collegiate is the area bound by the north side of Melrose (Kimberly) to the south side of Dunrobin between Roch and Watt. The north side of Melrose at Roch was already the site of a baseball diamond.

April 1949 saw the school board ask for an 8 room collegiate to be built between Trent and Sydney and Roch and Watt facing Roch. The plans called for a partial basement with an auditorium in the basement and 8 classrooms on the second floor containing grades 9 , 10 and 11 students. East Kildonan's Municipal Council favored a site bound by Roch and Watt and Melrose (Kimberly) and Chelsea. This site had first been set aside for recreational purposes for the East Kildonan Football Club in 1934, prior to this it had been a cow pasture. Council tells the school board that this land is valued at $\$ 22,450.00$ but it is willing to sell the land to the school board for $\$ 7,000.00$. A request to hold a $\$ 230,000.00$ money by-law to build a new collegiate is turned down by the Public Utility Board. A stop gap measure is approved, an addition to Lord Wolseley School to enlarge the space available for East Kildonan Collegiate there.

Finally in the early 1950's the provincial government and the leaders of the community grew impatient with the refusal of the voters to approve the building of a new high school and other badly needed schools. This time, the campaign was spearheaded by many of the business, veterans and service groups of East Kildonan. Large ads were taken out in the Elmwood Herald; a large-scale drive to get the voters to the polls was done. On May 22 1951 the voters approved the building of the new high school by a vote of $2250-331$. The baby boom years were on and the explosion in the school age population made sure the issue could not be delayed any longer.

The First Decade 1952-1962
The first sod was turned on March 171952 on a lot bordered by Roch to Watt and Melrose (Kimberly) to Chelsea. The school was to be called East Kildonan Collegiate but it was changed to honour the first governor of the Red River colony, Captain Miles MacDonell. At the time it was the largest school ground in Greater Winnipeg, measuring 1160 feet long and 554 feet wide. These large grounds did not last for long, as land was taken away for businesses on Watt St. new school Melrose, a community club, later a YMCA and further expansions to the YMCA. These developments were the result of the school board decision to buy only the most westerly part of this land for $\$ 3,500.00$ plus legal costs. It was a decision that later students and teachers of Miles Mac would regret, as it meant some athletic functions would have to be held elsewhere.

The official opening of Miles Mac took place on a usually chilly evening Thursday September 4 1952. R.D. Nicholson, Chairman of the East Kildonan School Board, led the ceremonies. There were over 300 adults, students and teachers in attendance. Others speaking were Premier Doug Campbell, W.C. Miller Minister of Education, Mayor J. Bodie of East Kildonan, J. Spalding of the Municipal and Public Utilities Board, R.O McFarlane, Deputy Minister of Education and N.A Matheson of the Lord Selkirk Settlers Association. The land for the school was part of the original Matheson farm in the Selkirk settlement. Father Shpytkovsky gave the invocation and Rev. D. Samson dedicated the school. At the ceremony, essay prizes were given to three East Kildonan students who wrote essays on the life of Captain Miles MacDonell (1769-1828). Premier Campbell cut the ribbon opening the school. The MacDonell tartan ribbon was of the Glengarry Clan of Scotland of which the Miles MacDonell's family originated. The other officials attending
the ceremony all wore ribbons of the Glengarry Tartan as well. After the opening ceremonies, all those in attendance toured the school.

The Miles Mac of that day was much smaller than the present school. The first plans called for an auditorium/gym, as well as domestic science and shop areas, but these were eliminated to save money. These "frills" would have cost an additional \$105,000.00. The Miles Mac of opening day is now the science wing. The school cost $\$ 130,000.00$ to build and $\$ 16,000.00$ to furnish. The school was built with many shortcuts taken to save money; this was to cause many headaches in the future. It was of a slab construction causing the school to shift on its foundations, with oil fired boiler for heating, which had to be repaired many times in the early years. There were only 8 classrooms, no gym and it was already too small when it opened. It suffered from water overflowing the school grounds from the ditches that lined Melrose and Roch. The paving of the streets and sidewalks around Miles Mac were not completed until 1957. There were 6 rooms of Grade 10 and 11 students, numbering 158 students and 2 rooms of Grade 5 students, who should have been at Prince Edward School but that school was overcrowded. The first graduating class of 1953 consisted of only 55 students. The first principal of Miles Mac was J.E. Scarrow who was the last principal of East Kildonan Collegiate, he stayed until 1967, and Miles Mac's longest serving principal. In those early years all students were taught the same courses there were no choice in school programs. The number of courses was actually less than students were able to take for many years at East Kildonan Collegiate. It would take several years before Miles Mac students had the same opportunities as their predecessors at East Kildonan Collegiate had enjoyed.

The courses offered in Grade 11 were

1. English Literature
2. English Composition
3. Social Studies (History)
4. Biology
5. Health
6. Phys Ed/ Health
7. Geography
8. Mathematics

Grade 10 courses included

1. English Literature
2. English Composition
3. Grammar
4. Social Studies
5. General Mathematics
6. General Science
7. Phys Ed/ Health
8. History
9. Business Practical

One notable event that brought attention to the school in those early years; happened early on the morning of June 7 1954, when two thirds of the roof were torn off during a violent windstorm, which brought hurricane strength winds to the Winnipeg area. This same windstorm also spread a fire that destroyed two blocks of Portage Avenue, and is known as the Times Building Fire. Following, a heavy rainfall caused flooding in the roofless section of Miles Mac. Staff and students combined to push the water out of the school. Miles Mac was closed for three days and an inquiry was called to determine the cause of the missing roof. It was determined that shortcuts in construction to save money were responsible for the damage but no action was taken against the contractors.

Another important date in Miles Mac history was April 231954 when the voters approved the construction of Melrose Junior High. It opened on April 221955 with a lane separating it from Miles Mac. The 18 -room school also included an auditorium/gym now known as Gym B. this school, which in 1962 became Miles Mac's north wing was built for $\$ 345,000.00$. The bill to supply desks for the new school came to $\$ 10,710.00$; the 24 teacher's desks only cost $\$ 636.00$. The new Melrose auditorium is built in a way that it can be divided into 3 classroom if the need arises.

The day before Melrose Junior High opened April 21 1955, voters in East Kildonan approved the first addition to Miles Mac, a 8 room, two storey expansion at a cost of $\$ 120,000.00$. This addition was finished on November 101955 two months behind schedule but it was not filled with students until January 1956. Again Miles Mac had students other than high school students within its walls. The new upper level was filled with four classes of Grade 7 students from the already overcrowded Melrose. The lower level held two classes of Grade 10 students and two classes of Grade 1 students.

The first beginnings of Melrose Community Club were began in the summer of 1955, when a baseball diamond was set up on what was then the eastern part of Miles Mac's grounds. On April 231956 this eastern part of the grounds was formally given to the East Kildonan Parks Board for a new recreational site called East Kildonan Recreational Centre, a satellite grounds for East Kildonan Community Club (Bronx Park). This new site became Melrose Park Community Club the next year.

The fall of 1955 saw the setting up, of Home and School Association through out East Kildonan; Miles Mac's was set up on October 20 1955. It met the second Wednesday of every month during the school year. It provided support to the school and helped raise money for school activities by holding events like the annual tea. The Miles Mac Home and School Association lasted to the mid 1960's when it declined and ended due to a lack of parents willing to volunteer. It came back in a different form in the 1990's.

Miles Mac and Melrose Junior High facilities were used, by a variety of community groups. Many teas and community events were held in the Melrose Auditorium. There was a projection room in the auditorium where movies could be shown. Election polls were held in the auditorium, which was also a gym for sports events. The hallways of Miles Mac were used for a United Church Sunday school for 1955 and 1956.At its peak 152 children and 18 adults filled the halls.

The fall of 1956 saw the first class of Grade 12 students at Miles Mac. The same fall saw the beginning of the first commercial class, 26 typewriters and $26 \$ 50.00$ desk and chair sets were bought. This was the beginning of the multi track high school education. East Kildonan was growing rapidly and so was Miles Mac the student population was up to 322. Melrose Junior High had exploded to 808. The next year 1957, Melrose reached its peak population of 860. The following year 1958, Munroe Junior High opened, and students from the southern part of East Kildonan went there. This relieved the pressure on Melrose Junior High where the space would soon be needed for the growing population of Miles Mac.

Courses offered to Grade 11 students in 1956-1957 included

1. English Literature

10. Phys Ed/ Health

Courses offered to the first class of Grade 12 students in 1956-1957 included

1. English Composition/ Prose
2. English Drama/ Poetry
3. Mathematics (Algebra and Geometry)
4. Chemistry Theory
5. Physics
6. French
7. Phys Ed/ Health

On February 271959 a vote to put all high school students in East Kildonan, North Kildonan, East St. Paul and part of St. Clements into a new school Division River East School Division \# 9 was approved. This is not popular in East Kildonan but Miles Mac becomes part of this new division. From 1959 to 1967, the River East School Division pays the East Kildonan School Board $\$ 30,000.00$ per year for East Kildonan's equity in Miles Mac. These payments cease with the amalgamation of the East Kildonan School District into the River East School Division in 1967.

September 1959 brought further changes to the students of Miles Mac. Textbooks for the first time were provided to all students in Manitoba including Miles Mac students for free. Up to this time students had to buy their own textbooks, this sometimes was a hardship for poorer families and large families. This month also saw the move of 3 grade 12 classes into the Melrose building due to the rapidly growing high school population. The new River East School Board tried to buy the Melrose Building from the East

Kildonan Board but the East Kildonan Board would only rent part of the building and it refused to sell.

January 1960, voters approved a new addition for Miles Mac, 8 more rooms including a home economics room, an industrial arts room, an art room and a new gym/auditorium with a stage. This gym is now known as Gym A. Voters at the same time also approved a new high school for North Kildonan, which became River East Collegiate. The year 1960 saw the first River East Science Fair held in the Melrose Auditorium now known as Gym B. November 281960 saw the official opening of that year's Miles Mac addition with a reception held in the new gym. December 1960 saw a contest held among Miles Mac students to design a school crest.

March 91961 brought the sale of the Melrose building to the River East School Division for $\$ 400,000.00$. The voters approved it on April 19. The East Kildonan School Board used the money to build a new junior high school further north, this became John Henderson Junior High.

Students at Melrose finish their last day on March 16 1962, on the following Monday March 19 they become students of John Henderson Junior High which opens its doors for the first time. March 20 sees the old Melrose building becoming officially part of Miles Mac, some classes from the overcrowded south wing move in but it is the following September before every classroom is used. April 1962 sees Gym A used for the second time for a Minstrel show as a Kiwanis fundraiser. This type of show soon becomes unacceptable in the changing times of the 1960's.

Sports in the first decade of Miles Mac included volleyball, basketball, curling, track and field events, and soccer for the boys. All of these sports were played against other Winnipeg area high schools in the Intersuburban Conference. This conference included such schools as West Kildonan, Norwood, St. James, Selkirk, Glenlawn and Transcona. Intramural sports included the above mentioned ones plus hockey, bowling, football, badminton and gymnastics.

The first few years of Miles Mac included few clubs such as the student council, sports committee, glee club, social committee, yearbook committee, debating club and of course the drama group which in the early year put on plays such as Love Pirates of Hawaii and The Gypsy Rover. By the end of Miles Mac's first decade one could also be a member of such groups and clubs as the Camera Club, Dance Club, school newspaper, the school orchestra, the pioneer club, science club, Model United Nations Assembly, a cheerleader, chess club and the art club.

The early yearbooks contained few photographs as compared to today but did contain class write-ups, individual student write-ups, class histories and many examples of artwork and student literary work. There were many ads for local businesses of the time, most of, which have long since disappeared from the community. All of the yearbooks up to 1960 were softcover and black and white only. The first hardcover yearbook was the

1961 edition. These early yearbooks contain a much better representation of the school year than more recent ones and usually contained more actual pages than later years when the student population was much larger.

It took several years for students to fully identify with the name Miles MacDonell, in the first few years East Kildonan and Miles MacDonell were used almost interchangeably. In the first 3 years the school rings used the letters E.K.C. instead of M.M.C. The feelings of students still belonging to East Kildonan Collegiate instead of Miles MacDonell Collegiate took time to get over. School uniforms may have contributed to this feeling as E.K sports uniforms were still being used for inter- school sports to the end of the 1950's and were still being used for intramural sports as late as 1964.

The Second Decade 1962-1972

September of 1962 saw Miles Mac grow by over 200 students from June and with all of the classrooms of the former Melrose now full; Miles Mac was now one of the largest school in Manitoba with over a 1000 students. The number of programs a student could take had grown along with the student population. There still was the university entrance program now called Matriculation. The Commercial program still existed also but now there was a program called New General, a program designed for students who didn't plan to go to university but who wanted a general high school education. Programs that were of a specialized technical nature, this included Drafting, Electrical and Industrial joined it. These programs were designed to lead to an immediate job after high school.

October 13 saw the grounds of Miles Mac reduced again in size when the sod was turned for the new YMCA; it would open on October 10 1963. The danger of nuclear war was brought home to the students of Miles when on October 291962 a practice drill evacuation was held at Miles Mac.

Signs of a new age were evident when a new larger Safeway was built on Henderson Highway at the newly named Kimberly in June of 1963. Earlier that year A \& W had come to Henderson Highway. Summer and early fall 1964 saw Dairy Queen and Champs come to Henderson Highway as well. November 1965 would see the opening of the Northdale Shopping Centre and the arrival of Zellers and other businesses.

October 1964 saw the introduction of two-hour parking on Bronx, Kimberly, Helmsdale, Chelsea and an extension of the two-hour parking on Roch. The first two-hour parking restrictions were placed on Roch in front of Miles Mac in March 1958. This was in response to local residents complaining that they were unable to park in front of their own homes. This change was to add many dollars to the city coffers over the years and cause many students to play "musical cars" on a daily basis.

The fall of 1964 saw the arrival of evening adult high school classes to Miles Mac. It was a booming success as over 400 adults took classes and established a tradition of adult education that exists to the present. That same fall saw 180 high school students living on Roberta Avenue and north, being forced to go to River East Collegiate to relieve the
pressures on an overcrowded Miles Mac. One of the students forced to go to River East Collegiate and complete his grade 12 there, is future Miles Mac teacher Vic Kuzyk.

November 161964 saw the introduction of the first bus service for students of Miles Mac specifically for students living in the Morse Place district. Two Metro Transit buses left Lyall (Almey) and Panet Road at 8:37 AM travelling along Munroe to Watt then up Kimberly to Roch and Kimberly. The return trip to Morse Place took place at 4:10 PM.

To make it easier to travel between the north and south wings of Miles Mac a concrete passageway 144 feet long, 10 feet tall and 10 feet tall costing $\$ 21,000.00$ was opened on November 26 1964. It kept the rain and snow off but there were frequent complaints it was cold in the winter.

During the middle of the 1960's Miles Mac had a student handbook that covered every conceivable area of student life, it covered school information, activities, rules, course requirements, clubs, sports, the student council constitution, the words to the school song and school cheer. For $\$ 3.00$ a year, your student fees included your student card, student handbook and diary, your yearbook, all student newspapers. There was a $\$ 1.00$ caution fee for your locker and your textbooks. Many of the rules and policies listed would seem rather bizarre to today's students. Certain staircases were for up only and others for down only, detentions were the result if you were caught going the wrong way. The official detention room was room 30 . There were some rules that were not listed that every student would know without them being written down. One was that every female student had to wear a dress or skirt in school and it couldn't be too short. This feature was law for Miles Mac until about 1970. It along with not wearing a hat in school seemed not to have been questioned, it was just part of life.

The school day in 1965-1966 consisted of $7-40$ minute periods beginning at 9:10, 9:45, 10:40, 11:25. Lunch was from 12:15- 1:35. Afternoon classes started at 1:35, 2:20, 3:10. School finished at 3:50. Opening exercises began at 9:00 for all students. Students had 5 minutes to move to the next class. Detention was at 4:00 and lasted for 30 minutes. If you skipped out of detention, you were then assigned 3 days of detention. If you missed any of these days you could then be suspended. Homework had to be brought to detention and the work had to be done during this time.

The first part of 1966 was notable for its severe weather that affected all Miles Mac students and Winnipegers in general. In February the temperatures were - 40 C , six days in a row. On one day it dropped to -45 C with the wind-chill making it feel like -65 C . March 4 brought the blizzard that all future blizzards were measured against. That Friday morning brought a storm that lasted till Saturday, bringing over 35 cm of snow and winds gusting to 110 kph . Many people were literally stranded in their homes, as snowdrifts blocked many doors. The 500 block of Dunrobin Avenue was particularly hit hard, as a watermain break left residents without water for 39 hours, as city workers were unable to get to the scene. Miles Mac students were off school that Friday and were unable to return to school until Tuesday.

June 1966 brought a change in career for one Miles Mac teacher when Russ Doern was elected to the Manitoba Legislature for Elmwood under the NDP banner.

The school year 1966-1967 ushered in Canada's Centennial year and Miles Mac students share in Canada's $100^{\text {th }}$ birthday. Miles Mac students form a Centennial Club, which helps, organizes events. On January 14, 218 Miles Mac students along with 6 teachers walk the 25 km to St. Andrews on the Red. The group left the school at 10:00 AM arriving at St. Andrews between 2:30 and 3:45 PM. River East Collegiate students at Sutton and Henderson join them. The temperature was in the -20 C range but only 2 students dropped out before reaching their goal. Selkirk Collegiate students who walked from Selkirk for a dance and refreshments join them at St. Andrews School.

February 171967 brings a retirement dinner for Principal Scarrow by the River East School Board. Mr. Scarrow Miles Mac's first and longest serving principal retired at the end of June.

February 181967 has 4 students going to Quebec City to compete in the Quebec Winter Games.

On the evening of May 161967 from 7:00 to 9:30, Miles Mac students blitz East Kildonan to raise funds for a new scholarship to be named in honour of Mr. Scarrow. The fund is jumpstarted by a $\$ 500.00$ contribution by Miles Mac teachers.

The day of May 241967 brings two events to Miles Mac. In the morning Miles Mac students along with other school in East Kildonan plant trees at an 11:30 AM ceremony. In the evening what could be called Miles Mac's first reunion is held in Gym A.; to honour Mr. Scarrow and to raise funds for the J.E. Scarrow Centennial Scholarship. All former students and teachers are invited along with parents and area residents. Ticket sales are used to enlarge the scholarship fund.

Early 1967 brings administrative changes to schools in East Kildonan on March 101967 when with vote to form one school division for all students grades 1-12. The River East School Division becomes the only school division for all of East Kildonan, North Kildonan, East St. Paul and part of St. Clements.

September 1967 saw a new principal Mr. Dick take over; he had previously served as vice principal of Miles Mac. On the night of October 10, Miles Mac was broken into for the first time in its history. There was some vandalism and a small amount of things were stolen. These kinds of incidents were becoming much more common in East Kildonan much to the concern of area residents.

In June of 1968 a new scholarship was offered for the first time but it occurred as a result of tragedy. Bill Masterton a graduate of Miles Mac in the 1950's died in March 1968, while playing in a game for the Minnesota North Stars of the NHL. The Masterton family
gave a scholarship in his honour. Bill Masterton was a fine athlete and competed in all sports at Miles Mac.

The fall of 1968 saw the introduction of the Occupational Entrance course at Miles Mac. This course offered students, classroom time and practical work experiences in the community. It became an important part of Miles Mac and while it changed names over the years, this program existed at the school well into the 1980's. One of the unfortunate results was the student in this program and the rest of the students tended not to mix and it seemed like there was two separate student bodies living under one roof.

September 191968 saw Miles Mac broken into again, this time the acts of vandalism and the theft is greater; this second incident brings a better security system for the school.

A more unusual event occurred on the grounds of Miles Mac in April 1969 when three police cars are sent to corral a bewildered deer. This time the six police officers are unable to capture the intruder as the deer made its escape.

The summer of 1969 brings further changes to the students of Miles Mac, cable television arrives in the area and a new principal arrives Mr. Kormylo was a member of the original staff.

The new school year brings big changes in the schedule of students as the student population reaches 1322; as this is well above the capacity of the school a staggered schedule is introduced. School runs from 8:00 to 5:00. There are thirteen 40- minute periods and lunch is only 40 minutes as well. Grade 11 and 12 students go from 8:00 to 2:30, grade 10 students go from 10:00 to 5:00. This schedule continues the next year as well when Miles Mac reaches its all time peak population of 1391.

Manitoba's centennial year of 1970 brings the last physical change to Miles Mac when a $\$ 505,000.00$ addition is announced in April 1970. The addition includes a new much larger material resource centre, a new theatre, small group rooms, a larger administration area, guidance office and some additional science room space. At the same time approval is given for a new high school in East Kildonan, Kildonan East this will help reduce the size of Miles Mac when it opens to students in September 1971. Miles Mac's addition opens four months behind schedule in January 1971. It had been intended to complete the work during the summer of 1970, as not to disrupt classes but this was not to be.

September 1971 sees a much smaller student population of 953 and the introduction of the semester system, the first high school in Winnipeg to choose it. Locker and caution fees are raised, $\$ 1.00$ for lockers, $\$ 5.00$ for textbooks. The student fee is also raised to $\$ 8.00$ which included the cost of a yearbook but the yearbook committee later complains their share is not enough to publish a proper yearbook.

January 1972 brings a unified city into effect. The first East Kildonan Community Committee Conference brings over 300 residents to Miles Mac theatre A. to elect 36 citizen advisors. This number will wither in time.

The number of clubs and groups one could join grew in Miles Mac's second decade as the student enrollment grew. Some groups only lasted a year or two while others lasted for many years. Some groups from earlier years like student council continued but the partial list of new groups in the second decade included the Arts and Science Committee, The French Club, Touchdown Quiz Team, Reach For The Top, The Elections and Awards Committee, Radio Amateur Club, School Spirit Committee, Publicity Club, Ukrainian Dance Club, Literature Club, Conductor's Club, Rings and Jacket Committee, Slide Rule Club, Mathematics Club, Current Affairs Club, Make- Up Club, Geography Club, Red Cross Club and many more.

The number of sports one could partake at Miles Mac also grew and there were clubs and organizations to represent these sports as well. Two different sports councils were set up to represent both boys and girls. New sports included include handball, tumbling, water polo, weight lifting, wrestling, cross-country. Miles Mac teams were provincial champions in a number of sports including cross-country, basketball and by the early 1970's volleyball especially varsity boy's volleyball; this record in volleyball was to continue to the end of the 1970 's.

Yearbooks in this period changed with the changing time; the amount of written material greatly decreased and the amount of photographs greatly increased. By the end of the decade there was no room left for individual student write-ups or representative literary work of students. The yearbooks 1970 and 1971, the years of the largest student population, appear overcrowded which was due to a lack of funds devoted to the yearbook.

The Third Decade 1972-1982
With the beginning of the third decade change continued at Miles Mac, the electrical and industrial programs were transferred to Kildonan East. It was still possible to take drafting but only as an optional not as a full program. Students did not have to take all university entrance courses in order to go to university, so the distinction between students planning to go to university and those who didn't began to break down. While students in the past had their own distinct stream, now they were more likely to attend classes with other students on different path from their own. There was now more option courses that didn't fall into the traditional academic stream. The commercial program was now called business and now students bound for university, could now take business programs like typing. The occupational entrance program was still a program distinct from the rest of the school. All students except for those in the occupational entrance program choose their own schedule and their own courses. The old system of home rooms no longer existed, students now chose their own faculty advisor; you didn't have to even have your faculty advisor as one of your teachers.

The third decade saw almost a year by year decline in Miles Mac's enrollment, falling from 951 in September 1972, to 641 in September 1981. The River East School Division instituted an open boundaries policy beginning in September 1972 which may have
helped Miles Mac from dropping in enrollment even more. Open boundaries made it possible from a student outside a specific school's immediate catchment area to attend that school if there was space available. This made it possible for a student for example, living in the northern parts of the River East School Division to attend Miles Mac. Under the old system, this student would have had to attend River East Collegiate. As Miles Mac always had room during this period, students were able to attend Miles Mac. The semester system was only in existence at Miles Mac for high school in the River East Division, so this allowed students to come who needed a more flexible schedule. It was not uncommon for students to come for one semester to complete a course rather than to spend a whole school year elsewhere.

The highlight of the 1972 - 1973 school year was Mardi Gras 73 held at Miles Mac April 26-27 1973. This was open to all members of the community whether they attended Miles Mac or not. It began on the morning of April 26 with a parachute jump onto the school grounds of Miles Mac by several jumpers. There was a public open house where a visitor could partake of a number of events. One could see a film festival. There were dance groups performing Ukrainian and examples of contemporary dance. Teachers and students did renditions of popular television shows. There was a political panel discussing the issues of the day, speakers on subjects like life behind bars, racial discrimination. Other events included a pancake breakfast, a smorgasbord followed by a Mardi Gras dance. People in attendance could also see sports displays and community group displays.

The day before Mardi Gras opened April 25, was a day begun by picket lines outside Miles Mac and other schools in River East. That day was marked by a one-day strike of clerical workers who wanted parity with Winnipeg School Division staff. They didn't get it but a longer strike was averted by an evening settlement.

The yearbook for 1973 was marked by many problems and as a result it contains little of the highlights. It was marked by the resignations of three separate student editors. One of these editors had completed all the necessary work, only to see it all thrown out by accident just before it was to go to print. Coming out finally in November 1974, many 1972-73 students never received it; to this day many still remain at the school.

September 1973 saw the beginning of religious teaching on a voluntary basis at Miles Mac along with students at John Henderson Junior High. Students had to opt into the program and about 50 students did. September 1973 also saw the matching of Miles Mac students with younger boys, sponsored by the Big Brothers and Big Sisters Association. Some of the matches lasted longer than the scheduled school year.

October 51973 saw a political discussion held at Miles Mac with the three provincial party leaders telling an overflowing crowd of students in Theatre A, why they joined the party they represent as leader. Each leader and the students in the audience discussed the merits of each party during a question and answer period.

To celebrate Winnipeg's centennial in 1974, Miles Mac presented "Salute to Winnipeg" on April 18-19 1974. Following the previous year's Mardi Gras many of the same kind of events were held. There was the pancake breakfast and smorgasbord. There were speakers on various subjects like Winnipeg's past and where Winnipeg was headed. There were displays from such diverse groups from the Winnipeg Flying Club to the League for Life. As in the previous year the events were open to the general public but unfortunately it was not quite as well attended.

The year 1974 also saw the return of large-scale drama productions with the successful "Finian's Rainbow" For a number of years drama productions had not been held at Miles Mac for lack of interest but "Finian's Rainbow" started a new interest in the subject.

The school year 1974-75 saw another very successful school production this time "Li'l Abner". This production saw one of the largest student casts in Miles Mac history. The varsity boys volleyball team won its second straight provincial championship in a row a record that would eventually go on to five straight years by 1978.

The 1975 yearbook cover would offer a style that had never been done before and likely would never be tried again with a female student posing in a pair of cut off shorts and bare midriff. It was a sign of the times that students would be willing to experiment with new ideas.

September 1975 saw Mr. Peter Friesen became Miles Mac’s fourth principal. That fall also saw the beginning of the new 20 credit system begin at Miles Mac and all other Manitoba schools. Courses that ran for a whole semester were worth 1 credit; those that ran half a semester were worth half a credit. A student could take up to 8 credits a school year with twenty credits being necessary for graduation. This made it possible for a student to graduate in January after only attending for 5 semesters instead of the normal 6 semesters.

The mid 1970's were a time when as many as 50-60 students from Hong Kong attended Miles Mac to improve their English skills and to make entry into Manitoba universities a easier prospect. Most of these students were highly motivated to succeed and often were among Miles Mac's best students. Few of these students lived in the immediate area and as a result few took part in school activities outside the classroom. There was little socializing between these students and the rest of the student body.

Relations between students and staff were always important to the sense of the school and in January 1976 this came out in the open when the student president was quoted in the Herald. She said relations were rocky between students and teachers. This along with comments that student council and students in general, didn't back her up lead to some heated discussions. After making these comments were published she said she had been misquoted and denied making them in a letter to the Herald.

April 1976 brought the retirement of Mrs. Goodwin after a career as head secretary at Miles Mac for 20 years. A reception was held for her at Kildonan East. When Mrs. Goodwin at started at Miles Mac, she had been the only office staff, now she was one of four working in the office.

Miles Mac held its first sell off of old yearbooks on May 25 1976. There were none available before 1966 but over 100 yearbooks were sold for $\$ 1.00$ each for the years 1966-1975. These same years would still be in stock for Miles Mac's $50^{\text {th }}$ reunion in 2002.

In March 1977 there was a proposal by the school board to upgrade or renovate the science wing of Miles Mac. The plan was to increase the science storage space, replace the sinks and get new gas outlets. The current gas outlets were described as being antiques by a school board official. The provincial government was trying to curtail expenditures and turned down the request for funding.

The work study program received frequent mention in the local paper the Herald, stories were often written by the head of the work study program Vic Kuzyk. Students receiving worker of the month were given prominent mention often with their picture in the Herald.

The school schedule for regular students consisting of 4 slots, work-study students had their own separate time schedule. School started at $8: 15$ with opening exercises, which included "Oh Canada", followed by the Lord's Prayer and then morning announcements. Slot 1 began at $8: 25$ and went to $9: 35$. There was a morning break of 20 minutes from 9:35 to 9:55. Slot 2 ran from 9:55 to 11:10. Lunch was from 11:10 to 12:10. Slot 3 began at $12: 10$ and went to $1: 25$. This was followed by a 10 -minute afternoon break. Slot 4 ran from 1:35 to $2: 47$. This last class ended at $2: 47$ to allow students coming by school bus to catch their buses, as school buses were run on a very tight schedule through out the division.

One Miles Mac tradition that began in 1977, was the almost annual trip to Europe over the Spring break period. April 1977 brought 30 Miles Mac students to London and Paris. These two cities were frequent destinations over the years but other locations in Western Europe would also be visited.

The school year 1977-78 was unique in two ways. First Miles Mac for the only time ever, had two co-presidents of student council; this brought interesting challenges to student government.

On November 4,5 1977 Miles Mac celebrated its $25^{\text {th }}$ anniversary. The Friday night had an opening get together at 7:30; names of the people in attendance were put on a giant wall registration. Miles Mac's first principal opened things officially at 9:00 when punch was served. A Request to have wine had been turned down by the school board. There was a repeating slide show of the school's first 25 years. There was a dance and fashion
show revue running from 9:00-11:00, an estimated 400 people were in attendance in Gym A.

Saturday's events were begun by an open house at the school from 2:30 to 5:00. There was a memory room and a coffee room. A meeting to set up an alumni association was held at 3:00. Saturday evening brought a social at the convention centre; about 600 people paid $\$ 7.00$ for a buffet lunch and dancing to a 10 piece band.

A small committee of six people, including a former student and current teacher Shirley Dudeck organized the reunion. Rick Burzynski student body president for 1976-77 served as chairman with 1975-76 student body president Shawn Hughes as vice chair. Doreen Wozny served on the committee along with two other former students.

An annual tradition that began in 1978 was the athletic banquet, for several years it would be held at Rossmere Country Club but over the years it would be held at various locations. This was the time to honour that year's athletes and to present the sports awards.

The school year 1978-79 saw Miles Mac donate more to charitable events than ever before raising over $\$ 2000.00$ for the Lion's Telethon, through a wake thon. Through a Christmas concert involving 82 students, Miles Mac raised $\$ 140.00$ for the Christmas Cheer Board. Miles Mac students also participated in the Shinerama citywide campaign for the third straight year. Miles Mac students and staff also continued their highly successful blood donor clinic which had been a yearly event since the early 1970's. Miles Mac students concerns for the needy and to work for an improved world, were to grow more significant as the years passed.

April 1979 saw improvements to the science wing of Miles Mac at a cost of \$74,980.00. New storage room was added in 3 rooms, new sinks and gas outlets were added and student work areas were improved to provide more flexibility in teaching.

October 1979 saw a further sell off of old Miles Mac yearbooks, ones up to 1975 sold for \$1.00 each, 1976 sold for $\$ 1.50$ and the 1978 edition sold for $\$ 2.75$.

The biggest event of the 1979-80 school year was the students of Miles Mac taking on the responsibility of sponsoring a refuge family from Vietnam. Students and staff raised $\$ 4000.00$ to rent and completely furnish an apartment. They provided English lessons, drove the family to medical and dental appointments. They helped Mr. Vuong find a job, registered the family for a number of programs, and supplied interpreters. The sponsorship lasted from December 1979 to December 1980. The students of 1980-81 continued the sponsorship and as a parting gift gave the family a final gift of $\$ 1339.00$.

September 1980 brought the introduction of the English as a second language program (E.S.L.). This helped integrate students whose first language was not English into further education possibilities.

In December 1980 the YMCA asked the River East School Division for a strip of Miles Mac's field for a new parking area. The 200 feet by 25 feet strip was needed for a new parking area as the YMCA was expanding its building onto its current parking lot. The school division agreed to the request and as a result the field shrunk again. The baseball diamond on the Kimberly side had to be relocated as a result of the addition.

March 251981 was a red-letter day when Miles Mac got approval to set up the International Baccalaureate Program, (I.B.) for the fall of 1982. The I.B. began in Geneva Switzerland in 1967, it begins in Grade 11 but a student has to take a preparation year in Grade 10. A student must take six main study categories plus two option subjects. The I.B. program has standards established by an office in Geneva. It directs the curriculum, supervises the setting and marking of exams. It is designed for students who have already displayed proof of academic achievement. Miles Mac was the only school in the River East School Division to get the I.B. program and the first high school in Manitoba. This established Miles Mac as a centre of academic achievement and a high school that would soon draw students from far outside the immediate catchment area. The first class beginning in the Grade 10 preparation year of 1981 had 28 students.

The 10 years from 1972-1982 saw a decline in student numbers of over 300 students and as a result there were less clubs and activities than the previous 10 years but many things like student council, yearbook, newspaper, chess club and Reach For The Top continued. There were new organizations founded like the Asian Student Association to serve the large Asian student population. While the smaller student population made it harder to compete against larger schools in sports, the varsity boy's volleyball team did win 6 provincial titles during this decade.

The Fourth Decade 1982-1992

The fall of 1982 saw a population increase at Miles Mac of 50 students, which was a shock to the River East School Board administration, which expected a further decline in the numbers. There were now 30 adults registered in regular day classes. Miles Mac had 52 out of the 54 visa students in River East School Division. These students paid $\$ 1875.00$ to attend classes, which was much lower than what other school divisions charged. In September 1983 the fees to attend school were raised to $\$ 3400.00$ per year and this increase caused the number of visa students to dramatically decline.

September 1982 saw 33 students in the I.B. Grade 10 preparation year and 21 students in the Grade 11 first year of the actual I.B. program. That fall saw new programs introduced two in the area of vocational programs, child and health care and the cosmetology program in the freshly renovated north wing. Another program introduced was the Professional Career Experience Program, which combined academic study with work experience in a professional, business or government setting. There was a program designed for mature students in an intensive two-semester business-upgrading program, in accounting, data processing, clerical and microcomputer courses.

The regular academic program continued as before, the regular business program and the work-study program now known as the 04 program continued to exist. Miles Mac now had more program streams for students than ever before.

September 1982 saw the arrival of Zane Zalis and the first year of Prodigy and the school band. The music program was to become a bigger and bigger part of school life for students and it would help to bring many gifted students to Miles Mac.

Other highlights for the 1982-83 school year was the forming of the Asian Students Association. The freshmen boys' volleyball team won the provincial championship. The girl's field hockey team won the conference title. Weight training was added to the sports menu. Miles Mac held its first Christmas banquet. Miles Mac held it's first winter carnival week, which included activities such as snowshoe race, a water balloon toss and a pillow fight.

The year 1983-84 saw the first wacky week; it included 3 days of games and challenge events. Students welcomed the newest staff members at the Christmas party with a personal gift. For the first time a Noel Coward play was performed at Miles Mac with the presentation of "Blithe Spirit".

The next year 1984-85 was the last year for principal Peter Friesen. This year saw the beginning of 3 different musical groups, Prodigy, Stage Band and a new choir group. Evening dances were brought back after an absence of a number of years. Students and staff started a new tradition, one of collecting for only two charitable groups per year; the first ones chosen were UNICEF and Steve Fonyo's Journey for Life. Miles Mac held its first gym riot, 120 students and staff were divided into 4 teams and competed against each other. This year was unique in another way when two Spirit Weeks were held, one in September and another in April.

A new program arrived at Miles Mac in September 1985 when the first French Immersion students arrived in Grade 10. These students had started late immersion at Munroe Junior High in 1982 as Grade 7 students. Two years later French Immersion would be offered in all 3 years.

Mr. Degen arrived as Miles Mac's fifth principal in September 1985. A sad event occurred in August 1986 when Walter Szutiak passed away suddenly. Mr. Szutiak had taught drafting at Miles Mac since 1960.

Miles Mac held its first ever fashion show on May 211986 with fashions from the casual to the formal.

Other highlights for 1985-86 included Peace Week sponsored by the Peace Committee. The Peace Committee was to become ongoing committee, continuing into future years. A new week was organized into the student schedule called the Festival of Life and Learning, it dealt with activities relating to the arts, culture and entertainment. The stage
band group started another new tradition when over 100 students went to Fargo, North Dakota, performing in area schools.

The school year 1986-87 brought Rick Hansen to Winnipeg, Miles Mac made its largest contribution ever with a $\$ 8000.00$ donation to his man in motion drive. The Peace Committee organized several events including representing the school at the annual peace march. Mike Shklanka retired after 26 years at Miles Mac.

The year 1987-88 saw the first graduation of French Immersion students. Cheerleaders returned as a part of sports events after a long absence and for the first time in school history there was a freshmen as well as a varsity squad. Another school tradition returned when a ski trip to Fernie B.C. was organized. Crazy Days was held again this time as a week of noon hour events. Mr. Degen retired after 3 years as Miles Mac principal.

Mr. Charlie Douglas returned to Miles Mac in September 1988 as principal, he had spent the previous 29 years as principal of Neil Campbell. Due to a very serious accident he was unable to take charge until early 1989. Ted Stoesz took on the role of acting principal until Mr. Douglas was able to resume his duties.

The school year 1988-89 was the last year for the 04 program at Miles Mac. Changing its name over the years it had existed for 21 years at Miles Mac. September 1989 saw it move to Kildonan East along with several teachers who had taught it. A new program began in September 1988 for disabled and handicapped students at Miles Mac.

The beginning of 1990 saw the retirement of two teachers who had taught at Miles Mac for over 30 years, Miss Newton and Mrs. Bejzyk. The year saw Miles Mac compete for the first time ever in the French version of Reach For The Top, Genies en Herbe. Miles Mac cheerleaders competed in two events, a first for Miles Mac cheerleaders.

Recycling of paper and cans came to Miles Mac in September 1990 when a new committee, the Environmental and Social Awareness (E.S.A.) was formed and took on the role of organizing recycling. They also organized students to search the community around Miles Mac for recyclable items, over $\$ 750.00$ was given as a result to the Variety Club Telethon. Miles Mac had its first ever hockey team. Prodigy performed on CBC radio for the first time. The Miles Mac band performed in New Orleans. Miles Mac held Activity Day, a variety of activities such as horseback riding and tours to various Manitoba communities were held.

The last year of Miles Mac fourth decade 1991-1992 saw the retirement of Mr. Douglas after over 40 years of teaching. This year also saw an exchange teacher from Australia, Jo Burt arrive to sample Canadian life. Prodigy performed at the Grey Cup breakfast and at the Brandon Jazz Festival. Miles Mac held its first Heritage Day with students dressed in native costumes of all the ethnic groups represented at Miles Mac. Another first was a citizenship court held at Miles Mac with 54 people becoming Canadian citizens.
For the first time since the 1970-1971 school year the student population rose to over 1,000 students reaching 1,024 students

The Fifth Decade 1992-2002
The school year 1992-1993 saw the arrival of a new principal Mrs. Lintott, Miles Mac's first female principal. Jeremy Kushnier was Miles Mac's 41st student president. Jeremy has since gone on to fame on Broadway.

Other highlights of the year were an exchange program with students from Dorval Quebec. Eighteen students from Miles Mac and an equal number of students shared a week in each other's communities. For the first time ever, students traveled to Asia for spring break, travelling to Hong Kong and Malaysia. Another highlight of the year was Miles Mac's first Lip Sync Contest.

The year 1993-1994 saw the departure of Mr. Stoesz, the school's longest serving vice principal. He had been vice principal since 1978 and a teacher since 1973.

Miles Mac student council members literally took it on the chin and the face during wacky week, when other students were able to pie them in the face on one memorable day.

Miles Mac focused on Asia Studies and the Pacific Rim as new courses were offered for the first time on this important part of the world. Miles Mac students fundraising efforts brought in $\$ 600.00$ to buy play equipment for a Vietnamese orphanage.

The second annual Lip Sync brought in over $\$ 1000.00$ to the Children's Wish Foundation.

Miles Mac's Reach For The Top team was the best ever going all the way to the National Championships in London Ontario.

Prodigy performed live on CBC Radio for the first time bringing the excellence of Miles Mac to a wider audience. This performance became the first of an annual appearance on CBC Radio and it would help to lead to other opportunities.

The school year 1994-1995 saw the beginnings of the Internet at Miles Mac with a few dial up connections in place. The teaching of Japanese began in the S2 level. Other firsts were labs established in social studies, second languages and music. The business education program became completely computerized. The days of the typewriter were gone forever. To help students with the more practical aspects of their business education a new business club store was opened at Miles Mac.

This year students of Miles Mac continued with their service to others when a new committee the Vietnam Orphanage Committee was formed. A 3 on 3-basketball tournament brought money for the Terry Fox Foundation. Two local bands performed at Christmas in a fundraiser for the Christmas Cheer Board.

Miles Mac held its first Heritage Day as students representing 20 ethnic groups performed.

The April 1995 provincial election saw a Miles Mac student run for office collecting over 2000 votes for the NDP.

The year 1995-1996 school year saw the school wired for multi-access to the Internet with 50 Internet stations. The library became fully electronic as well, when computers replaced the card catalogue files.

A new program began with the introduction of Challenge Tomorrow. This program offered a transition to the workforce with volunteering, job shadowing as well as academic programs.

Spanish was offered for the first time and Japanese instruction was offered in all years as world languages took on an increasing important role.

Miles Mac efforts for the less fortunate continued as money was raised for a foster child in Vietnam as well as continued support for a Vietnamese orphanage. Money was also raised for UNICEF, the Children's Wish Foundation and the Christmas Cheer Board.

Seventeen lucky students had the trip of a lifetime when they traveled to the Queen Charlotte Islands. They explored old growth forests and saw the results of clear-cut logging up close. The trip included 3 days of kayaking for the lucky students.

Technology continued to expand at Miles Mac in 1996-1997 when technology science centers were created. Spaces in the south wing were renovated for the special education transitional program. This program helps special needs students learn to adapt to the world outside the school environment. A lab to upgrade reading and mathematics skills was created in the support services area. An IBM Pentium lab for science and drafting was created. There was also a new multimedia Macintosh 7 lab for computer science programs.

The year 1997 was the year of the biggest flood since 1852 and Miles Mac students were in the thick of it. Students were given time off from school to help build dikes in the East St. Paul and Fraser's Grove area.

Other highlights from the year were BarnYard Week when students did animal impersonations; the varsity boys won the provincial championships. Prodigy and band students traveled to Toronto to participate in workshops and clinics as well as performing at 3 high schools.

The school year 1997-1998 saw the school day broken into 5 slots with each slot a little shorter than before and the school day a little longer. This provided more flexibility in scheduling for both students and staff.

The parent's advisory council became very active for the first time in years. It supplied important in supplying support and advice for the council.

This year was the beginning of Miles Mac's exchange with a Japanese boarding school based in Switzerland. Students were able to see how Japanese students experience a much more formal and restricted form of schooling. Miles Mac students were also able to experience some of Europe's major cities such as Paris and London.

The first symposium on international trade was held at Miles Mac this year. Speakers included Premier Gary Filmon, speakers from the Chamber of Commerce, River East School Division and the Asia Pacific Foundation.

Highlights for the 1998-1999 included the arrival of Mr. Bowles as Miles Mac's eighth principal. Miles Mac held the first university post-secondary education day. Forty-five institutions from across Canada set up information booths with information relating to programs they offered. With Spanish now being taught the first ever, Spanish Learners Conference was held.

The start of a school honour wall and the sports hall of fame were begun. This was to be completed the next year. These two projects were to honour students, teachers and principals from Miles Mac's past.

Miles Mac's music program had a couple of firsts. There was the release at Christmas time of Miles Mac's first CD, called One Voice -One World. It took the efforts of 130 students to produce the CD of which 1100 copies were sold in a period of 3 weeks. Sixty students traveled to Guadalajara Mexico to perform before Mexican audiences and appear on Mexican radio.

The year also saw a further exchange program with the Japanese boarding school in Switzerland with 14 Miles Mac students traveling there. This time 16 Japanese students traveled to Winnipeg to explore Canadian life.

The Boys soccer team won the provincial championships for the first time in Miles Mac's history.

The school year 1999-2000 was another year to remember. Miles Mac students donated $\$ 2000.00$ for the living legacy project. This was a project to beautify the grounds around Miles Mac by doing things such as planting trees.

The wall of Honour officially opened; the parent's council and Food Services Management who run the school canteen funded it.

Miles Mac had its first ever robotics club and two teams competed in the Manitoba Robot Games.

The year also saw once more Japanese exchange students but also for the first time, Miles Mac hosted Spanish exchange students as well.

The music program re-released its first CD One Voice- One World Christmas album and then created a new CD, Noel in their own new studio.

The Challenge Tomorrow students helped the community by renovating homes in the area doing painting and minor repairs to senior's homes.

For the second time in four years the varsity boy's basketball team were provincial champions.

The new century's 2000-2001 year brought some new firsts; Miles Mac students started the first book club in the school's history. Miles Mac held its first Anti Racism Rally. Seniors in the community were not forgotten as Miles Mac held a Christmas dinner just for them. Prodigy performed after the dinner for to the appreciative audience.

Music students from Prodigy and the choir, 64 students in all made a trip to Scotland to perform there. Using the technology of the Internet they made a CD with a Scottish group.

During Citizen's Week, a citizen court was held at Miles Mac. Twenty people representing 6 countries became Canadian citizens taking the oath of citizenship in Gym A.

Miles Mac's $50^{\text {th }}$ year 2001-2002 was a special one as the school celebrated with a giant reunion, over 1600 former students and teachers paid for the whole weekend. Friday June 282002 consisted of a musical revue at the Pantages Theatre followed by a wine and cheese reception at the Convention Centre.

Saturday June 29 consisted of an open house at the school with perhaps 5000 people in attendance. It was the hottest day of the year with the temperature reaching 34.3 and the humidex making it feel like 47 degrees. Despite the hot weather and even hotter school, everyone enjoyed the open house. The day ended in the much cooler environment of the Convention Centre for a dinner and dance.
