

Hugh Polson, Pioneer of Kildonan, Dies

Descendant of Original Selkirk Settlers Succumbs At Residence

Hugh Polson, youngest son of the late Angus Polson and Anne Henderson, and a descendant of original Lord Selkirk settlers, died on Wednesday at his residence, 513 East Kildonan road. Mr. Polson was born on the old homestead, Lot 94, East Kildonan, 63 years ago and lived there all his life. He continued the occupation of his father as a farmer. Mr. and Mrs. Polson, sr., died in 1891 and 1902, respectively. The Polson family is one of the best known among the old Kildonan settlers. Polson ave., in St. John's, and Polson school, East Kildonan, are named after the Polson family.

Mr. Polson was always much devoted to church work and during the early part of his life he was connected with the Old Kildonan Presbyterian church and for several years was a member of the managing board. Of late years, following the rapid growth of Elmwood and the south portion of East Kildonan, where his home is situated, Mr. Polson became connected with King Memorial church. He was a member of the board of managers for several years and at the time of his death was chairman of the board and was also a member of the men's building club of the church.

Mr. Polson was always fond of good, clean sport and was an enthusiastic curler, being a past president of the Elmwood Curling association. He was exceedingly popular among Elmwood curlers. He took part in the annual bonspiel games and watched with interest games in which he did not take part. Nine years ago Mr. Polson married Miss Jessie Goodall, who survives him. He also leaves the following brothers and sisters: Rev. Samuel Polson, East Kildonan; Angus Polson, Victoria, B.C.; Mrs. D. McCormick, Mrs. A. H. Sutherland, Miss Minnie Polson and Mrs. R. Murray Simpson, all of Winnipeg, and Mrs. J. MacKay, of Enderby, B.C.

The funeral service will be held at the residence in East Kildonan on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, interment taking place in Kildonan cemetery.

U.S. CONSIDERING TROOPS RECALL

Washington Disturbed Over Delinquency of Germany In Paying Bill

PARIS, Aug. 31. — The United States government, through a channel quite apart from the United States embassy in Paris, has reopened its inquiry as to the propriety of keeping United States troops on the Rhine.

One reason for the United States attitude, it is understood, is the fact that nothing has been paid by Germany for the maintenance of the army, the bill for which now amounts to \$270,000,000, less certain sums, estimated at \$40,000,000 consisting of requisitions made by the United States military authorities on the German government.
