

## Municipality of Old Kildonan Council History 1921-1929

July 1921 – The Municipality of Old Kildonan becomes a municipality on July 1, 1921. It is carved out of the Municipality of West Kildonan consisting of the area west of McPhillips Street and north of the Bergen Cut-off. The first council meeting is held on July 11, 1921 in Nesbitt Hall at 2 pm. Reeve Robert Wilkie Toshack, Councillors, John Clouston, John Henry, Magnus Harper and Harry James Seymour. Samuel Henry Summerscales is appointed the Secretary-Treasurer at a salary of \$150.00 per month. Dr. R. Brodie Anderson is appointed the Health Officer for \$100 for 1921. Robert Jacob is appointed the Municipal Solicitor. Charles Clarke of Kildonan Parish Lot 29 and George Smith of Kildonan Parish Lot 24 are appointed Poundkeepers. William K. Smith is appointed the Weed Inspector at 60 cents per hour. Council meetings are held on the second Saturday of the month and if necessary the fourth Saturday of the month.

July 1921 – All orders of lumber are to be purchased from the Winnipeg Paint and Glass Company

July 1921 – The Municipal Offices are to be located in Room 210 of the Chamber of Commerce Building in downtown Winnipeg

July 1921 – The Imperial Bank of Canada is chosen as Old Kildonan's banker

July 1921 – Mr. Edward Murray is hired for \$6.00 per week to look after the pumping station on Red River Boulevard

July 1921 – There are complaints about garbage and manure being dumped illegally on Kildonan Parish Lot 23 between Main Street and the C.P.R. tracks

July 1921 – Secretary-Treasurer Summerscales is appointed a Commissioner for taking oaths

July 1921 – Mr. Hutt of Oscar, Hudson and Company Chartered Accountants is appointed the Old Kildonan Arbitrator for the division of the West Kildonan School District

July 1921 – The speed limit in Old Kildonan is to be 20 mph on all roads with the fine for speeding not to exceed \$50

August 1921 – A well and pump is advertised for Ridge crest Avenue near Aikins Street

August 1921 – Mr. H. Aubrey Bayne is appointed the Assessor for \$600 for the year

August 1921 – Mr. John Dalgarno and Mr. John Albert Sutherland are appointed acting Policemen for a retaining fee of \$10.00 per month and 70 cents per hour when engaged in police matters. They are not given any guns, uniforms, handcuffs or any identification

August 1921 – Reynold Limited is to print the voters list at 10 cents per name

August 1921 – The sidewalk across Main Street from Kildonan Station is to be changed to be in line with the sidewalk on John Black Avenue. The crossing on the sidewalk opposite the Kildonan Cemetery is changed to the north corner of the cemetery opposite the new gate.

August 1921 – Two pairs of handcuffs are purchased after the two acting policemen request them

August 1921 – A grader and drag are purchased from Kelly Powell and Company for \$313

August 1921 – The Kildonan and St Paul Agricultural Society receives a grant of \$100

September 1921 – The plank sidewalk on the east side of Main Street from the Bergen Cut-off Subway to the Kildonan Church is to be repaired

September 1921 – The Winnipeg Suburban Municipal Association is told that council is not in favour of joining the association at this time

October 1921 – Council asks the Winnipeg Electric Railway Company to construct a streetcar line on McPhillips Street to join Old Kildonan and West Kildonan. The company says no saying there are insufficient people living along McPhillips.

October 1921 – Old Kildonan is to join the Good Roads Association

October 1921 – Old Kildonan is to work on Pipe Line Road which is the boundary between Old Kildonan and West St Paul

October 1921 – Council asks West Kildonan to issue a building permit for a streetcar waiting room on Main Street at Templeton which is a transfer point for Old Kildonan and West St Paul

October 1921 – Council asks the Municipal Solicitor to prepare a by-law to form a new school division which comprises the area of Old Kildonan

November 1921 – J. Delgarno resigns as Constable

November 1921 – There are complaints about the condition of the pump at the corner of Hartford and McPhillips. Two loads of stones from Murray Avenue are to be used to fill in the land around the pump. A sign is to be placed at the pump that cattle and horses are not to be watered within 10 feet of the pump.

November 1921 – Ratepayers meetings are to be held in the John Black School and at Nesbitt Hall

November 1921 – Cinders are to be placed on John Black Avenue at a cost of \$1.00 per load

November 1921 – John Blechner is to be paid \$5.00 per day for overseeing the work on Pipe Line Road. A man with a team of horses is to be paid \$7.00 per day and scrapper holders are to be paid \$4.00 per day

November 1921 – The Salvation Army receives a grant of \$50

December 1921 – The Constable is asked to check the running time of all streetcars on Main Street running from Templeton to Middlechurch from 5 pm to the last car from December 19-22.

December 1921 – A total of 500 yards of gravel is to be placed on McPhillips south of Templeton, 500 yards of gravel on McPhillips north of Templeton and 700 yards on Murray Avenue

December 1921 – A street light is to be placed at the corner of Scotia and John Black Avenue

December 1921 – Constable J. A. Sutherland is requested to have a telephone installed in his house so he can be reached with Old Kildonan paying the bill for his house on John Black Avenue

December 1921 – West Kildonan is to pay 25% of the cost of gravelling McPhillips Street with Old Kildonan paying 75% of the cost with the average cost \$2.50 per yard

December 1921 – Reeve Toshack receives an indemnity of \$135 for 1921 with the councillors making \$35

December 1921 – Council tells the Greater Winnipeg Water District that it wishes to withdraw from the district

January 1922 – Reeve Robert Wilkie Toshack, Councillors, John Clouston, John Henry, Magnus Harper and Harry James Seymour

January 1922 – Samuel Henry Summerscales is to be paid \$125 per month, Robert Jacob, the Solicitor is to be paid a retaining fee of \$250 for 1922 and Dr. R. B. Anderson the Medical Health Officer is to be paid \$75 for 1922.

January 1922 – Banking business is to be transacted with the Union Bank of Canada

January 1922 – Old Kildonan joins the Winnipeg Suburban Municipal Association

January 1922 – A total of \$40,000 is to be borrowed from the Union Bank of Canada to meet current expenditures

January 1922 – The Wiring Inspector of West Kildonan is asked to act as the Wiring Inspector of Old Kildonan for a fee of \$1.00 and 10 cents per mile for travelling expenses

January 1922 – Charles Nye is to look after the cinder supply for Red River Boulevard, he is to be paid 47.5 cents per hour work depositing the cinders with the cinders to be hauled for \$1.00 per yard

February 1922 – The Kildonan and St Paul Agricultural Society receives a grant of \$100

February 1922 – William Laver is appointed as an assistant to W. K. Smith the Weed Inspector

February 1922 – Council votes down a proposal to extend the Kildonan Cemetery in parts of Kildonan Parish Lot 26 between Main and McLean

April 1922 – A grader and scarifier is purchased from Powell Equipment for \$675

April 1922 – A culvert is to be placed on the west side of McPhillips opposite the new blacksmith shop on Kildonan Parish Lot 18 in the Outer Two Miles

April 1922 – H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor at \$600 for the year

April 1922 – C. Clark of lot 31, Kildonan Parish Lot 32 is appointed a Pound Keeper along with George Smith of Highland Avenue

April 1922 – Weed Inspector W. K. Smith is to be paid \$150 for the season

April 1922 – All four councillors are appointed Fire Guardians for Old Kildonan

April 1922 – Aubrey Hutt is appointed the Arbitrator for Old Kildonan for the division of the West Kildonan School District

May 1922 – Water is to be drained from the slough crossing Park Manor Boulevard

May 1922 – A sidewalk crossing and culvert is to be in on the east side of Main Street opposite Highland Avenue

May 1922 – The ditch is to be cleaned out on the east side of Main Street from the Bergen Cut-off Subway to John Black Avenue

May 1922 – H. A. Bayne is to be engaged as the Engineer to take levels of McPhillips Street in order to provide for the proper cleaning of the west side ditch, to drain water from the old creamery and from near John Black School. Culverts are to be placed across Beecher Avenue on the east side of McPhillips opposite John Black School. Wages to be paid for the work are 80 cents per hour for a man and his team and 40 cents per hour for a man alone.

June 1922 – The ditch on the west side of McPhillips is to be cleaned out immediately With Foreman George Silver and workers George Smith, H. Gunn and S. B. Gunn

July 1922 – A new culvert is purchased for the corner of John Black Avenue and Main Street

August 1922 – To prevent fraud, council demands a statement from every man who works for the municipality a statement signed by his foreman showing the days and hours worked

September 1922 – H. A. Bayne is asked to take levels in the swamp crossing Park Manor Boulevard and see if this swamp drains into the larger swamp

September 1922 – A meeting is to be held with West St Paul over the condition of Pipe Line Road

October 1922 – West St Paul is to employ the teams repairing Pipe Line Road paying 70 cents per hour to the teams doing the work and paying the Foreman \$5.00 per day with Old Kildonan paying 50% of the cost.

October 1922 – A ditch is to be constructed on Park Manor Boulevard with the ditch on the west side of Main Street is to be widened

October 1922 – A water district is to be created for the regulation of operating costs on Red River Boulevard

October 1922 – Council appeals the decision of the arbitrators regarding the division of the West Kildonan School District

November 1922 – Old Kildonan pays \$3,034.69 to West Kildonan School District # 8 covering the cost of arbitration

December 1922 – Mr. J. W. Callaghan on Foley Avenue near Main Street is asked to move his outdoor closet (outhouse) to more than 20 feet from his neighbour's well and more than 4 feet from the lane.

December 1922 – The Salvation Army is given a grant of \$75

December 1922 – Reeve \$234 for his services for 1922 with the four councillors receiving \$130

January 1923 – Reeve Robert Wilkie Toshack, Councillors, John Clouston, John Henry, Magnus Harper and Charles Edward Nye

January 1923 – Robert Jacob is appointed Solicitor, Dr. R. Brodie Anderson, Health Officer and J. A. Sutherland is appointed Municipal Constable at a retainer fee of \$10 per month and 70 cents per hour for police work

January 1923 – Edward Murray is appointed the Superintendent of the Water System of Red River Boulevard at a salary of \$6 per week. He is warned not to neglect his duties and not on any account allow the water system to fail.

January 1923 – Old Kildonan joins the Winnipeg Suburban Municipal Association for a membership fee of \$30

January 1923 – A grant of \$40 is given to the West Kildonan Curling Club to entertain the Scottish Curlers on their visit to Old Kildonan

January 1923 – A total of 350 yards of gravel is to be placed on Main Street and 500 yards is to be on McPhillips Street between Kildonan Parish Lots 13 and 26

February 1923 – Mr. T. S. Watts, Chairman of the Old Kildonan School District # 2102 and Mr. W. K. Smith, the Secretary-Treasurer tells council that the school district needs about \$500 per month to run the two schools and to pay for Old Kildonan students attending school in West Kildonan. The two Old Kildonan schools are John Black School and Kildonan School.

March 1923 – The Kildonan and St Paul Agricultural Society receives a grant of \$100

March 1923 – Old Kildonan is to borrow \$30,000 from the Union Bank of Canada to meet current expenditures

March 1923 – Old Kildonan makes an offer to the West Kildonan School District for paying for the cost of Old Kildonan attending school in the school district from April 21, 1922 to December 31, 1922

March 1923 – The West Kildonan Horticultural Society is given a grant of \$25

March 1923 – A 12 inch roadplow is to be purchased for \$56.25

March 1923 – Old Kildonan offers to pay the West Kildonan School District \$10,000 in cash and \$2,500 for the two schools in Old Kildonan to settle the school district division. West Kildonan wants \$13,500 but settles for the \$12,500

April 1923 – H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor for \$600 for the year

April 1923 – Old Kildonan is to pay men and their teams 75 cents per hour for working for the municipality

April 1923 – The Constable's retainer fee is raised from \$10 to \$15 per month

April 1923 – Edward Murray is appointed the Weed Inspector at \$30 per month for 5 months

April 1923 – Council pays the phone bill of Constable J. A. Sutherland which is \$7 for a 3 month period

April 1923 – George Smith is appointed the Pound Keeper for the Main Street District

May 1923 – Harold English is given a permit to operate a soft drink stand on the east side of Main Street north of the Bergen Cut-off Subway

May 1923 – The Old Kildonan School District levy is \$9,550 for 1923

May 1923 – W. J. Pitts is appointed the Pound Keeper for the district west of McPhillips

June 1923 – Municipal Wards are to be created

Ward One – The north side of Murray Avenue on the north, east of McPhillips, McPhillips on the west, Red River on the east

Ward Two – Murray Avenue on the south, McPhillips on the West, the West St Paul boundary on the north and Red River on the east

Ward Three – The City of Winnipeg boundary on the south, Four Mile Road on the west, Templeton on the North and McPhillips on the east

Ward Four, Templeton Avenue on the south, Four Mile Road on the west, the West St Paul boundary on the north, McPhillips on the east

June 1923 – Mr. Richards of Belmont Avenue in West Kildonan is appointed the Electrical Inspector at \$1 per inspection

June 1923 – Winnipeg Hydro is to provide electricity for 17 applicants on McPhillips Street from Kildonan Parish Lots 19-32 for minimum revenue of \$360 per year

July 1923 – The Winnipeg Parks Board is to pay 2/3 of the cost of a cinder sidewalk opposite the Kildonan Golf Course

July 1923 – By-law # 3 of the Old Kildonan School District # 2102 is introduced to borrow money by the way of debentures for a new two room school

August 1923 – Constable J. A. Sutherland asks for a gun as he has been shot at 3 times while trying to make an arrest. He is authorized to carry a 38 or 40 calibre revolver.

August 1923 – The West Kildonan Fire Brigade is given \$20 for fighting a fire in Old Kildonan and a box of Tuckett's cigars costing \$6 are given to the members of the fire brigade

October 1923 – West Kildonan is to rent the nuisance grounds in Old Kildonan for a period of 4 years to offset the purchase price to be received from Old Kildonan. The rent is \$350 per year for the four year period.

October 1923 – McGregor Street is to be extended from Bleacher Avenue to Templeton Avenue

November 1923 – A foot bridge is to be placed across the ditch on the west side of McPhillips Street in front of the new Lloyd George School

November 1923 – A total of 600 yards of gravel are to be placed on Main Street, 800 yards on Murray Avenue and 600 yards on McPhillips Street

December 1923 – A grant of \$75 is given to the Salvation Army and \$30 to the Children's Aid Society

December 1923 – The Reeve is given an extra \$150 for his services in 1923

January 1924 – Reeve Robert Wilkie Toshack, Councillors Henry Charles Tait, Magnus Harper, John Henry and John Clouston

January 1924 – Herbert Aubrey Bayne is appointed to Assessor at \$600 for the year. Robert Jacob is appointed the Solicitor at a retaining fee of \$250 for the year. Dr. Robert Brodie Anderson is appointed the Health Officer for \$75

January 1924 – Winnipeg Hydro is to provide street lighting on Main Street for 15 cents per night per light

January 1924 – The Winnipeg Electric Railway Company is asked to line the inside of the waiting room at the corner of Templeton and Main to prevent the writing of obscene material on the walls

February 1924 – Old Kildonan is to join West Kildonan in a combined territory within a restricted area for the eradication of bovine tuberculosis with the Provincial Government paying 2/3 of the cost of the slaughtered animals

February 1924 – A grant of \$63.36 equal to taxes is given to the West Kildonan Curling Club

February 1924 – Constable J. A. Sutherland is ordered to turn in his revolver

February 1924 – The services of Edward Murray, Superintendent of the Red River Boulevard Pumping Station are terminated due to the small income derived from the residents of Red River Boulevard. The one resident using the water is asked to look after the pumping of the water supply for his house.



March 1924 – The revolver is returned to Constable J. A. Sutherland and he is warned that in the future he must be more careful in upholding the dignity of his office

March 1924 – Mr. J. C. Robinson the Provincial Municipal Auditor is paid \$170.35 for auditing the books

March 1924 – D. S. McKay is appointed the Superintendent of the Red River Boulevard Pumping Station for \$60 per year and free water

March 1924 – The Old Kildonan School District levy is \$9,450 for 1924

April 1924 – A bridge 16 feet long and 14 feet wide is placed over the north ditch of Balgona Avenue opposite Lot 17, Plan 2480

April 1924 – The Weed Inspector is to be paid \$30 per month for 5 months

April 1924 – Notices are to be placed that animals are not to be watered within 50 feet of a public well

April 1924 – W. J. Pitts is appointed the Poundkeeper for Ward Four

May 1924 – Slow down signs are to be placed on McPhillips Street opposite Lloyd George School and John Black School

May 1924 – J. R. McDonald is appointed the Poundkeeper for Ward Two, P. Geswein is appointed the Poundkeeper for Ward Three and George Smith is the Poundkeeper for Ward One

June 1924 – The Municipal Commissioner's Levy for 1924 is \$4,066.09

June 1924 – The West Kildonan Horticultural Society receives a grant of \$25

July 1924 – The Union Bank of Canada increases Old Kildonan's line of credit by \$8,461.25

July 1924 – J. Dalgarno is to clean out the school toilets

July 1924 – Secretary-Treasurer Summerscales is given two weeks of holidays per year up from one week per year

August 1924 – The Winnipeg Selkirk and Lake Railway Company announces it will reduce the streetcar service on Main Street between Templeton and Middlechurch

August 1924 – Mrs. C. Harper claims to have paid \$40 to Constable J. A. Sutherland for the repayment of her relief account but Constable Sutherland only turns in \$20. He is told that if commits any further "irregularities" he will be dismissed.

September 1924 – Constable Sutherland repays the \$20 that he did not remit to the Secretary-Treasurer in August

October 1924 – Oak Kildonan along with the other municipalities along Main Street ask the Provincial Government to take over Main Street from the City of Winnipeg boundary to Winnipeg Beach

October 1924 – There is an investigation after Jacob Otto`s animals are taken from Pound # 3 without permission

December 1924 – The Reeve is to be paid an additional \$150 for his services in 1924

January 1925 – Reeve Robert Wilkie Toshack, Councillors, Henry Charles Tait, John Henry, Magnus Harper and John Clouston

January 1925 – S. H. Summerscales is reappointed the Secretary-Treasurer at \$1,800 per year

January 1925 – The West Kildonan Curling Club is given a grant equal to its taxes \$63.36

January 1925 – Council extends its sympathy to Councillors Harper and Clouston in their severe illness

February 1925 – Old Kildonan asks the Municipal Tax Commission to reduce Old Kildonan`s equalized assessment by half in order to bring the values in line with the adjoining municipalities

March 1925 – The Kildonan and St Paul Agricultural Society receives a grant of \$100

April 1925 – Council asks the City of Winnipeg to repair their portion of McPhillips Street

April 1925 – W. J. Pitts is appointed a Pound Keeper and the appointment of P. Geswein Pound Keeper for Ward # 3 is terminated

May 1925 – The contracts for dragging roads for 1925 are given to Edward Murray for Murray Avenue, Leonard Strobel for McPhillips south of the Bergen Cut-off, Ernest Peirce for McPhillips north of the Bergen Cut-off and Donald Murray for Main Street.

June 1925 – The West Kildonan and Old Kildonan Horticultural Society receives a grant of \$25

July 1925 – Council tells West Kildonan to put the nuisance grounds into a satisfactory condition as garbage is not being covered and night soil is not being deposited in trenches and is not being covered.

August 1925 – A portion of the Hebrew Sick Benefit Society land adjoining McPhillips Street is to be donated for road purposes

September 1925 – The Kildonan and St Paul Agricultural Society is given a grant of \$100

October 1925 – Old Kildonan's bank is now the Royal Bank of Canada

December 1925 – H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor for 1926 for \$600. He is ordered to reduce the assessment on all buildings by 20% and all land in subdivisions by a minimum of \$15

December 1925 – Douglas McKay is to be paid \$60 and given free water for looking after the Red River Boulevard Pumping Plant for 1926

December 1925 – The streetcar waiting station at Templeton and Main in West Kildonan is vandalized by a group of boys

December 1925 – The office rent for the Municipal Offices in the Chamber of Commerce building is \$25 per month

December 1925 – The West Kildonan Curling Club is given a grant equal to its taxes

December 1925 – Reeve Toshack is given an additional indemnity of \$150 for his services in 1925

January 1926 – Reeve Robert Wilkie Toshack, Councillors, Magnus Harper, John Henry, Henry Charles Tait and John Clouston

January 1926 – Old Kildonan is a member of both the Winnipeg Suburban Municipal Association and the Manitoba Good Roads Association

January 1926 – The Kildonan and St Paul Agricultural Society is given a grant of \$75

**February 1926 – Old Kildonan is against the proposed educational provincial levy which is to be levied against the municipalities**

**February 1926 – There are complaints about boys shooting on Kildonan Parish Lot 26**

**March 1926 – The Municipal Auditor is J. C. Robinson**

**March 1926 – The West Kildonan and Old Kildonan Horticultural Society is given a grant of \$25**

**March 1926 – Dr. R. Brodie Anderson is appointed the Health Officer for 1926**

**April 1926 – W. K. Smith is appointed the Weed Inspector for 5 months for \$30 per month**

**April 1926 – Brown and Rutherford are given the contract for the supply of lumber for 1926**

**May 1926 – A bridge is to be built on the boundary road between Rosser and Old Kildonan**

**June 1926 – A by-law is introduced for the licencing of dogs; \$2.00 for male dogs and \$3.00 for female dogs**

**July 1926 – Permission is given to Mr. Hyman Salendar to operate a bus on McPhillips from the City of Winnipeg boundary to Balgona Avenue. The bus is to operate on a two hour service between the Winnipeg City Hall and Balgona Avenue with the fare to be no more than 25 cents for a single trip.**

**August 1926 – There are concerns about the ditches in the open area being filled with drifting soil**

**August 1926 – The Manitoba Power Commission (Manitoba Hydro) is given permission to build a transmission line between the Town of Selkirk and the City of Winnipeg passing through Old Kildonan**

**August 1926 – Old Kildonan is to borrow \$10,000 by issuing debentures**

**October 1926 – The ditches on and near McPhillips are to be cleared of drifting snow**

**October 1926 – A total of 300 yards of gravel are to be placed on Fairfield Avenue from McPhillips to Pipe Line Road to build up the grade**

**November 1926 – Municipal election polling stations are to be held at the**

**J. A. Sutherland residence on John Black Avenue for Wards One and Two**

**Leonard Strobel residence on McPhillips Avenue on Kildonan Parish Lot 23 for Wards Three and Four.**

**The Deputy Returning Officers are to be paid \$7.60 and the Poll Clerks \$4.20**

**December 1926 – The Winnipeg, Selkirk and Lake Winnipeg Railway Company is to provide a “dinky” service on Main Street from 7 pm to 11 pm at 30 minute intervals**

**December 1926 – A grant of \$39.68 is given to the West Kildonan Curling Rink to cover its taxes**

**December 1926 – The West Kildonan and Old Kildonan Horticultural Society receives a grant of \$25**

**December 1926 – The Reeve is given an extra \$150 for his services in 1926**

**January 1927 – Reeve Robert Wilkie Toshack, Councillors, Magnus Harper, John Clouston, John Henry and Henry Charles Tait**

**January 1927 – Dr. R. Brodie Anderson is appointed the Medical Officer for 1927 for \$75**

**February 1927 – Lord Selkirk Highway signs are to be placed on the north and south boundaries of Main Street at a cost of \$10**

**March 1927 – John Beckett threatens legal proceedings if the ditches on Foley Avenue are not attended to before flood conditions prevail**

**April 1927 – Council asks the Good Roads Association to provide a grant covering 2/3 of the cost of placing 1,200 yards of gravel on McPhillips as 99% of the traffic on McPhillips is through traffic**

**April 1927 – Council asks that Pipe Line Road be placed under the Good Roads Act**

**April 1927 – The Old Kildonan School District levy is \$9,300 for 1927**

**April 1927 – A grant of \$75 is given to the Kildonan and St Paul Agricultural Society**

**April 1927 – The Salvation Army is given a grant of \$75**

**April 1927 – A grant of \$35 is given to the West Kildonan and Old Kildonan Agricultural Society**

**April 1927 – Murray Avenue and McPhillips Street are to be dragged**

**May 1927 – A cinder sidewalk is to be placed on Foley Avenue from Mrs. Seancy's house to Main Street**

**June 1927 – A survey is to be made on Nixon Avenue so a grade and ditch can be constructed**

**July 1927 – The Provincial Government is to pay 50% of the cost of gravelling McPhillips Street and Pipe Line Road**

**August 1927 – The ditch on the north side of Beecher Avenue is to be cleaned out**

**September 1927 – There are complaints about the cattle of Mr. Fronson being left around the well on Highland Avenue**

**September 1927 – A bike is bought for Constable Sutherland so he can travel around Old Kildonan and to catch speeders**

**November 1927 – Constable John Albert Sutherland is suspended as constable until the Provincial Police charges against him are cleared. He is ordered to return the handcuffs, bicycle and revolver.**

**December 1927 – Residents of Beecher Avenue agree to pay \$168 each annually to take care of the fixed charges for Winnipeg Hydro and pay 4.5 cents per kilowatt hour for light and 1.5 cents per kilowatt hour for heat**

**December 1927 – Douglas McKay, Caretaker of the Red River Boulevard Pumping Station is paid \$60 for his work in 1927.**

**December 1927 – George Shoell, Caretaker for the Kildonan Comfort Station at the Kildonan Cemetery is paid \$30 for looking after the station in 1927**

**L. Strobel for the southern half of McPhillips**

**July 1928 – The man-hole on the John Black Sewer on the west side of Main Street is repaired**

**July 1928 – There are complaints about manure being dumped into the McPhillips Street ditches**

**September 1928 – There are complaints about accidents being caused by drivers hitting the numerous parked cars on the streets at night (there are few street lights and cars are not required to have head lights).**

**September 1928 – Edward Murray is released from his duties as the Superintendent of the Red River Boulevard Pumping Plant. Douglas McKay is given the responsibility for the plant for a payment of \$5 per month and the right to use all municipal property in the Red River Subdivision.**

**October 1928 – Councillor Magnus Harper passes away**

**October 1928 – The pump on Hartford Avenue near McPhillips Street is to be repaired**

**November 1928 – Old Kildonan is to become a member of the Union of Manitoba Municipalities**

**December 1928 – A grant of \$37.20 is given to the West Kildonan Curling Club to cover the taxes**

**December 1928 – George Shoell is given \$30 for looking after the Kildonan Comfort Station**

**January 1929 – Reeve R. W. Toshack, Councillors, H. C. Tait, J. Clouston, M. Davis and J. Henry**

**January 1929 – The streetcar waiting room is vandalized with all of the windows broken and the stove is torn apart**

**January 1929 – Dr. E. W. Stewart is appointed the Medical Officer for 1929 for \$75**

**February 1929 - The C.P.R. is to provide 12 train car loads of cinders for \$5 per car**

**February 1929 – Old Kildonan asks the Provincial Government to take over McPhillips and reconstruct it, as Main Street is dangerously overcrowded during the summer months because of through traffic to Winnipeg Beach and more vehicles are taking McPhillips to avoid this traffic.**

**February 1929 – Old Kildonan is to borrow funds from the Imperial Bank of Canada, Main Street Branch**

**February 1929 – The Old Kildonan School District levy for 1929 is \$7,300**

**February 1929 – Council plans to prohibit fox farms east of Main Street**

**February 1929 – The Kildonan and St Paul Agricultural Society is given a grant of \$100**

**March 1929 – Peter Harper is appointed the Weed Inspector for \$30 per month for 5 months**

**March 1929 – The West Kildonan and Old Kildonan Horticultural Society is given a grant of \$50**

**March 1929 – Leonard Strobel is reappointed the Pound Keeper**

**April 1929 –H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor for 1930 at \$150 for the year**

**April 1929 – McPhillips Street and Murray Avenue are to be dragged**

**May 1929 – Templeton Avenue is to be extended from McPhillips to Pipe Line Road**

**July 1929 – The Winnipeg Electric Company is to build a power line from the Manitoba Power Commission (Manitoba Hydro) power line on McPhillips to McPhillips and Semple Avenue**

**July 1929 – Templeton Avenue is graded from McPhillips to Pipe Line Road**

**August 1929 – There are complaints that hay is be stacked on McPhillips partly blocking the roadway**

**September 1929 – A well is to be sunk on Woodbine Avenue in the Park Manor Subdivision**

**September 1929 – The Reeve is called in to intervene in domestic quarrels in two households**



**October 1929 – There are reports of potatoes being stolen from all over Old Kildonan**

**October 1929 – Constable Sutherland is dismissed after being found guilty of theft**

**November 1929 – Leonard Strobel and Charles E. Nye are appointed Police Constables**

**November 1929 – A reward of \$50 is offered for information leading to the conviction of the person or persons responsible for stealing potatoes**

**December 1929 – The Salvation Army is given a grant of \$75**

**December 1929 – George Shoell is given \$30 for caretaking at the Kildonan Comfort Station at the Kildonan Station**

**December 1929 – A total of 25 train car loads of cinders are to be placed on Pipe Line Road from Leila Avenue to Fairfield Avenue and on Fairfield Avenue from Pipe Line Road to McPhillips**

**December 1929 – The West Kildonan Curling Club is given a grant of \$37.20 to cover their taxes**

January 1930 – The Winnipeg School District charges Old Kildonan \$530.90 for Old Kildonan students attending school in Winnipeg as Old Kildonan has no schools for students past grade 9

January 1930 – The Municipal Commissioner's levy for 1930 is \$2,372.30

January 1930 – Leonard Strobel is reappointed Municipal Constable and Poundkeeper

March 1930 – Constable Strobel asks for the use of the municipal bicycle for his work

March 1930 – H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor for 1930 for \$400

March 1930 – West Kildonan and Old Kildonan Horticultural Society receives a grant of \$35

March 1930 – James Murray is appointed the Noxious Weed Inspector at \$30 per month for 5 months

April 1930 – J. Dalgarno is given the Road Dragging contract for McPhillips Street north of the Bergen Cut-off, C. DeFoort is given the contract for McPhillips south of the Bergen Cut-off and James Murray is given the contract for Murray Avenue.

May 1930 – J. A. Sutherland is given the contract for constructing the cinder sidewalk on Highland Avenue

June 1930 – By-laws are introduced to prevent the carrying of rifles and revolvers within Old Kildonan unless they have a permit signed by the reeve and to restrict parking on public roads by automobiles to 15 minutes

July 1930 – A public well is to be built in the Park Manor Subdivision

July 1930 – The Provincial Government is to help in the maintenance of McPhillips Street while Main Street is being reconstructed

July 1930 – The West Kildonan School District is paid \$16.34 for the education of Old Kildonan secondary students

August 1930 – The well in the Park Manor Subdivision is to be sunk by W. Ballendine for a \$100

August 1930 – Old Kildonan is to place 300 yards of gravel on the boundary road, west of McPhillips between Old Kildonan and West Kildonan

August 1930 – Council asks the Provincial Government to take over the repair and reconstruction of the John Black Sewer as extra water will run into it as a result of the Main Street reconstruction with Main Street being paved

September 1930 – Old Kildonan asks the Provincial Government to replace the crossings and sidewalks on Main Street which have been destroyed by the rebuilding of Main Street

October 1930 – The Provincial Government is asked to improve the bridges and culverts on McPhillips Street as the traffic is much too heavy for the current structures and stronger structures are needed. Council claims Old Kildonan is not in a financial condition to contribute any part of the cost.

October 1930 – In order to relieve unemployment in Old Kildonan, the Provincial Government and Federal Government are asked to join in a joint relief fund with the Federal and Provincial Governments paying 40% of the cost each and 20% by Old Kildonan to

1 – Place 1,000 yards of gravel on McPhillips Street

2 – Place 500 yards of gravel on Murray Avenue

3 – Construct a ditch on Nixon Avenue on Kildonan Parish Lot 24 from McPhillips to Pipe Line Road to relieve spring flooding

4 – Regrading Jaffray Road and reditching the ditch on the north side of Jaffray Road from Main to McPhillips

December 1930 – Old Kildonan is to pay 20% or \$1,200 of the cost of relief work with the other levels of government paying 80% for

1 – 10 train carloads of cinders or gravel on Beecher Avenue from the C.P.R. Tracks to McPhillips in Kildonan Parish Lot 19

2 – 3 carloads of cinders or gravel on Woodbine Avenue in Kildonan Parish Lot 30 west from Main Street

3 – 3 carloads of cinders or gravel on Park Manor Boulevard in Kildonan Parish Lots 29-30 west from Main Street

4 – 8 carloads of cinders or gravel on Leila from McPhillips to Pipe Line Road and on Pipe Line Road north to Kildonan Parish Lot 19

5 – 8 carloads of cinders or gravel on Balgona Avenue in Parish Lot 31/32 west of McPhillips Street

December 1930 – P. Hanrychuk the Section Foreman for the Winnipeg Electric Company is given \$25 to look after the waiting room at Main and Templeton for the winter season

December 1930 – The West Kildonan Curling Club is given a grant of \$40.92 to cover the 1930 taxes

December 1930 – Reeve Toshack is given an extra \$200 for his services in 1930

January 1931 – Reeve R. W. Toshack, Councillors, H. C. Tait, M. Davis, J. Henry and J. Clouston

January 1931 – The salary of Secretary-Treasurer Samuel Henry Summerscales is reduced by 10% from \$1,800 per year to \$1,620 per year

January 1931 – Leonard Strobel resigns as Poundkeeper

January 1931 – Rate of pay of casual labour for 1931, man and his team 60 cents per hour and for labour, 35 cents per hour

February 1931 – J. Bespalko the Weed Inspector is to be paid \$20 per month for a period of 5 months

February 1931 – Dr. Stewart is appointed the Medical Health Officer for \$75 for 1931

February 1931 – The retaining fee for the Municipal Constable is reduced from \$15 per month to \$10 per month

March 1931 – The Old Kildonan School District levy for 1931 is \$5,400

April 1931 – Council protests against the paying of any amount for the Winnipeg Drainage and Flood Prevention Scheme to which Old Kildonan has been assessed \$6,005.06 as council feels the scheme will not benefit Old Kildonan

April 1931 – Old Kildonan's equalized assessment for 1931 is \$592,000

May 1931 – Leonard Strobel is reappointed the Poundkeeper for 1931

June 1931 – The Municipal Commissioner's levy is \$1,162.90 for 1931

June 1931 – Council protest again being charged for the Grassmere Ditch/Colony Creek Drainage Scheme as the scheme will not improve the value of any land in Old Kildonan

July 1931 – Council opposes the holding of a dancing marathon at 'Paradise Gardens' owned by V. Josselin in Kildonan Parish Lot 35

July 1931 – Peerless Press is given the contract for printing 150 copies of the 1930 Auditor's Report for \$16.50

August 1931 – All unemployed persons are ordered to register at the municipal offices as soon as possible

August 1931 – H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor for \$250 for 1931

October 1931 – Jurors selection fees of \$3 are paid to Reeve R. W. Toshack, Assessor Bayne and Secretary-Treasurer Summerscales

November 1931 – A grant of \$41 is given to the West Kildonan Curling Club to cover the 1931 taxes

November 1931 – S. Zipursky the Old Kildonan Postmaster is told to move his post office sign on McPhillips Street back from the street to his own property

December 1931 – Reeve R. W. Toshack receives an extra \$200 for his services during 1931

January 1932 – Reeve R. W. Toshack, Councillors, M. Mawson, J. Henry, J. Clouston and H. C. Tait

January 1932 – Samuel Henry Summerscales is reappointed the Secretary-Treasurer at \$1,620 for the year. Leonard Strobel is reappointed the Police Constable for a retaining fee of \$10 per month and 70 cents per hour for police work and an extra 30 cents per hour when using his car. Dr. E. W. Stewart is appointed the Medical Health Officer for \$75 for the year.

January 1932 – The contract for supplying relief fuel is given to W. K. Smith, \$6.75 per cord for tamarac, \$6.75 per cord for birch, \$5.00 per cord for pine and \$4.50 per cord for poplar

March 1932 – The Old Kildonan School District levy for 1932 is \$4,950 for 1932

March 1932 – To save money the 1931 voters list is to be used for 1932 with corrections

April 1932 – James C. Murray is appointed the Noxious Weed Inspector for \$20 per month for 5 months

May 1932 – Council asks the Kildonan Presbyterian Church to donate the northern 30 feet of John Black Avenue which has been used for many years as a public road. The church is also asked to donate the portion of Scotia Street which is part of their property on Kildonan Parish Lot 26. These streets would then be maintained by the municipality.

May 1932 – Old Kildonan applies for membership in the reorganized Winnipeg Suburban Municipal Association which has a membership fee of \$20

June 1932 – Old Kildonan is to cooperate in the Greater Winnipeg Anti-Mosquito Campaign by building a ditch on the south side of Murray Avenue from the C.P.R. Tracks to Main Street. Council declines however to provide a grant.

August 1932 – The Kildonan Presbyterian Church declines to donate the northern part of John Black Avenue and Scotia Street in Kildonan Parish Lot 26

August 1932 – H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor for \$175 for 1932

September 1932 – Council is to drain the water lying on West Templeton Avenue by draining it into the municipal well on McPhillips Street

October 1932 – Council is told that the municipal well on McPhillips Street can only take in a small portion of the water lying on West Templeton Avenue before the water reaches the top of the well. Some local residents using the well do not feel it is a good idea to drain water into the well.

December 1932 – The rent for the Municipal Offices in the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce building in Winnipeg is \$30 per month

December 1932 – The West Kildonan Curling Club is given a grant of \$42 to cover the property taxes in Plan 1866, Kildonan Parish Lot 5

December 1932 – Reeve Toshack is given an extra \$200 for his services in 1932

December 1932 – The Hebrew Cemetery Association is asked to contribute \$50 towards snow cleaning on McPhillips Street

February 1933 – To save money street lighting on Main Street is to be terminated at the end of February 1933

March 1933 – The Old Kildonan Ratepayers Association asks for a municipal office in Old Kildonan instead of the Chamber of Commerce building in Downtown Winnipeg

May 1934 – A uniform is to be purchased for the Police Constable for a cost not to exceed \$32

May 1934 – McGregor Street is to be extended north from Templeton Avenue to Murray Avenue

May 1934 – Arlington Avenue is to be extended north across Kildonan Parish Lot 19

July 1934 – Old Kildonan goes on record stating the Federal Government should only hire labour for Government projects in the City of Winnipeg from among residents of Greater Winnipeg who have lived in the area for one year with a preference for married men

August 1934 – Council considers only selling land to people living outside of Old Kildonan if they agree to pay 5 years of taxes when they purchase the land

August 1934 – The C. P.R. is asked to give permission to extend McGregor Street across the Bergen Cut-off Branch

September 1934 – The Provincial Government asks Old Kildonan to cut relief cost as much as possible as the Federal Government is only paying 20% of the cost down from 1/3

August 1934 – The Provincial Government no longer provides grants for students for grade 9 so Old Kildonan decides to do the same. Parents of students in grades 9-12 must pay the full cost of their education.

October 1934 – Council is told there are only 3 grade 11 students attending school in West Kildonan

December 1934 – The West Kildonan Curling Club is given a grant of \$39.60 to cover the club's taxes for 1934

December 1934 – Douglas McKay is given a grant of \$60 for looking after caretaking duties for the Red River Boulevard Pumping Station

December 1934 – Reeve R. W. Toshack is granted an additional \$200 for his services as reeve in 1934

January 1935 – Reeve R. W. Toshack, Councillors, Sam Bondar, M. Mawson, J. Henry and J. Clouston

January 1935 – Dr. E. W. Stewart is appointed the Medical Health Officer for 1935 for \$75

January 1935 – Council asks J. A. Stitt M.P. to ensure 25 residents of Old Kildonan are given work on the building of the Selkirk Bridge across the Red River

January 1935 – Leonard Strobel the Municipal Constable is to be paid half the cost of his telephone service

January 1935 – Arthur Derbyshire is reappointed the Assessor for 1935 for \$400

February 1935 – The Old Kildonan School District levy for 1935 is \$5,550 and the Municipal Commissioner's levy is \$798.74

February 1935 – John Dalgarno is appointed the Weed Inspector for \$15 per month for 5 months

April 1935 – Cinders are to be placed on John Black Avenue from Main Street to the Kildonan Church gate

May 1935 – Council complains to the City of Winnipeg that the dam it built on the east side of McPhillips just north of the city limits is causing the water from the spring melting backing up into Old Kildonan damaging the grade on McPhillips

June 1935 – Council complains about the sign on Kildonan Parish Lot 23 on the Bondar Lane between the Impett place and the C.P.R. Tracks advertise picnics and dancing. Council is concerned about the drinking and dancing occurring every Sunday.

July 1935 – Arthur Derbyshire of Kildonan Ave (Kingsbury Avenue) West Kildonan is appointed to investigate relief cases for a period of 5 months for \$20 per month

August 1935 – Mr. Hoffman is to drill a well in the Red River Subdivision for \$2.50 per foot and \$2.00 per foot for a pipe. The well is sunk to a depth of 327 feet.

August 1935 – Municipal property in Kildonan Parish Lots 23 and 24 between Main Street and the C.P.R. Tracks is offered to the Greater Winnipeg Sewage Disposal District for a price of \$5,000 cash and \$700 per year for 10 years in lieu of taxes

October 1935 – Douglas McKay is terminated as Caretaker of the Red River Boulevard Pumping Station as the new well is completed to replace the pumping station.

October 1935 - A well is to be drilled at \$2.00 per foot in the Park Manor Subdivision on Woodbine Avenue

November 1935 – Municipal Deputy Returning Officers are \$7.00 and Poll Clerk \$5.00 for the municipal elections

December 1935 – Reeve Toshack receives an extra \$200 for his work as reeve in 1935 giving him a total indemnity of \$341.60, with the 4 councillors making between \$104.20 to \$131.60 for their indemnity and mileage.

January 1936 – Reeve Harry W. Swailes, Councillors, Matthew Mawson, John Henry, Sam Bondar and John Clouston

January 1936 – Samuel Henry Summerscales is reappointed the Secretary-Treasurer at \$1,440 per year. Leonard Strobel is reappointed the Police Constable at an \$8 per month retaining fee and 50 cents per hour for police work walking, 75 cents per hour for driving his car and 50% of his telephone bill. Dr. E. W. Stewart is reappointed the Health Officer for \$75 per year.

January 1936 – Casual labour is to be paid 25 cents per hour and 50 cents to a man and his team

April 1936 – L. Runzer is appointed the Poundkeeper

May 1936 – T. Hartle is told not to keep pigs between John Black Avenue and the north boundary of Kildonan School

May 1936 – A fire started by the Provincial Government’s Highway Department burns \$25 worth of the plank sidewalk on Aynsley Avenue

June 1936 – The Ukrainian Greek Orthodox Cathedral of St Mary the Protectress asks for permission to establish a cemetery on Kildonan Parish Lot 35 between Main Street and the C.P.R. Tracks but council denies the request

January 1937 – The Secretary-Treasurer is authorized to look for an office cabinet costing not more than \$50

January 1937 – Old Kildonan's equalized assessment is \$459,000 for 1937

January 1937 – The Old Kildonan School District levy is \$5,550 for 1937

January 1937 – The Old Kildonan Mill Rate for 1937 is 18.5 Mills for Controllable and 18.5 Mills for Uncontrollable

January 1937 – H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor for 1937 for \$175

January 1937 – Leila Avenue is to be graded with cinders from McPhillips to Pipe Line Road

February 1937 – Relief fuel wood is to be bought from A. G. Mancer for \$5.50 per cord

March 1937 – City of Winnipeg Hydro is given permission to construct a 13,000 volt transmission line through Old Kildonan to the Sewage Disposal Plant in consideration of electrical light service along Beecher Avenue East from McPhillips to McGregor Street

April 1937 – The constable's old revolver is sold to S. Bondar for \$4.30

May 1937 – A grant of \$10 is given towards Coronation Celebrations of King George VI and \$10 to the Old Kildonan School District for a school picnic

February 1938 – The Old Kildonan School District levy for 1938 is \$5,980 and the Municipal Commissioner's levy is \$899.97

February 1938 – The Provincial Government refuses to cover any further relief costs for Old Kildonan

February 1938 – The 1938 mill rate is 38 mills made up of Uncontrollable 19.5 Mills and Controllable 18.5 Mills

April 1940 – Council supports the Winnipeg Suburban Municipal Association resolution to require all municipal secretary-treasurers to be bonded

May 1940 – The property of the Hebrew Sick Benefit Society is withheld from tax sale

May 1940 – Council is told that D. S. Baker is building a dance floor behind his hot dog stand on Main Street and Red River Boulevard. Mr. Baker is told not to build his dance floor before council decides whether he can build it.

June 1940 – There are a total of 87 cattle owners in Old Kildonan

June 1940 – Leonard Strobel is to be paid 25 cents per hour for operating the grader behind the tractor not the 40 cents he requested

August 1940 – The Red River Boulevard Pumping Plant is to be sealed to protect it from theft and preserve it for possible use in the future than sell it for the small amount it would bring

January 1941 – Dr. E. W. Stewart is appointed the Medical Health Officer for 1941 for \$50. Leonard Strobel is appointed the Constable for \$15 per month. J. Dalgarno is appointed the Poundkeeper. Jacob and Morton are appointed the Solicitors. H. A. Bayne is appointed the Assessor for \$100

March 1950 – The Old Kildonan School District Board tells council that it wants to build a new school east of Main Street and move Lloyd George School to Templeton Avenue West on a 10 acre site. The two projects are estimated to cost \$30,000

March 1950 – A delegation to council supports the amalgamation of Old Kildonan and West St Paul

March 1950 – A municipal owned lots that are broken may be rented to municipal ratepayers for garden purposes only for \$1.00 per 25 foot lot

March 1950 – Kildonan Parish Lots 32/33 east of Main Street and north of Red River Boulevard is to be sold for a Drive-in Theatre and playground. The 14 acres are sold to Mr. M. Shnier for \$500 per acre. The conditions of the sale are;

1. The Power Line is to be moved at his expense
2. A policeman hired by the municipality is to be paid by the Drive-in Theatre
3. At least 75% of the 40 people needed to run the theatre must be hired from the community
4. A fence made of aluminum 7 feet high must surround the theatre except for the Main Street frontage

January 1964 – Peter Badiuk is appointed the Utilityman at \$360 per month and he is also appointed the Poundkeeper for animals other than dogs

January 1964 – Peter Kocay is appointed the Noxious Weed Inspector. John Matwichuk is appointed the Enumerator and Dog Licence Collector for half of the licence fees

January 1964 – The minimum rate of pay for municipal work is \$1.00 per hour

January 1964 – The Victorian Order of Nurses receive a grant of \$30

January 1964 – Emil Blackner is appointed the Constable for the Nuisance Grounds and for action against anyone dumping garbage or refuse on any road in the municipality

Council says it is unable to contribute to the Cultural Centre because of an insufficient population and because its tax levy is already extremely high.

January 1965 – Swift, MacLeod, Deacon, Kirby and Gregory are appointed the Solicitors and Carson Templeton are appointed the Consulting Engineers

January 1965 – Secretary-Treasurer John S. Desharnais is to be paid \$5,520 in 1965 and Utilityman Peter Badiuk is to be paid \$370 per month and \$2.00 per hour for overtime as well as being appointed the Poundkeeper

January 1965 – Henry S. Ross is appointed the Dog Licence Collector and Census Enumerator and Emil Blackner is appointed the Guardian of the Nuisance Grounds and to act as the Constable for garbage matters.

January 1965 – The minimum rate of pay for municipal work is \$1.00 per hour

January 1965 – The R.C.M.P. tells council it will no longer provide any police services for Old Kildonan as Old Kildonan has refused to pay a fair rate. The West Kildonan Police Department has also helped out.

February 1965 – Arrangements are made with the R.C.M.P. to temporarily police Old Kildonan

March 1965 – The Fitness and Amateur Sports Branch gives a \$600 grant to the Red River Community Centre for recreational purposes

March 1965 – Council provides a \$50 grant to the Victorian Order of Nurses, a \$50 grant to the Manitoba Heart Foundation, a \$25 grant to the Salvation Army and a \$25 grant to the Muscular Dystrophy Association

March 1965 – Old Kildonan is to borrow \$371,433 from the Municipal Development and Loan Fund to build a trunk sewer from McPhillips to Pipeline Road and a sub trunk sewer on Pipeline Road from Leila to a point 3,130 feet south.

March 1965 – Peter Kocay is appointed the Noxious Weed Inspector

March 1965 – Assistant Secretary-Treasurer Murray Cox and Utilityman Peter Badiuk both resign for higher paying jobs.

March 1965 – The Provincial Government is asked to increase its financial support to the Seven Oaks School Division as 73.5 % of the Old Kildonan Mill Rate is for schools

March 1965 – John Gardner is appointed as a Municipal Constable at \$100 per month, and 10 cents per mile for the use of his car and he is provided with a uniform.

April 1965 – Emil Blackner is kept in charge of the nuisance grounds but his employment as constable is terminated

April 1965 – No further bounty is to be paid for the destruction of skunks

April 1965 – W. J. Murray and Son Cartage Limited is given the contract for hauling garbage for one year for \$3,756

May 1965 – John Gardner resigns as Chief Constable. The City of Winnipeg is asked to provide police protection to Old Kildonan

June 1965 – The City of Winnipeg agrees to provide police protection

July 1965 – A. Martin receives the contract for the construction of the Scotia Sewer for \$5,365.30

July 1965 – The salary of Stan Eszczuk is increased by \$25 per month

August 1965 – Council refuses to sign a police protective agreement with the City of Winnipeg claiming the police protection it has been getting has been inadequate

August 1965 – Mr. James Patrick Devlin is hired as the Chief Constable at \$7,000 per year. Council is to rent a car for a police care and install police radar

September 1965 – A two-way police radio is rented for \$23.50 per month with the installation costs of \$73. The Chief Constable is authorized to purchase a radar unit, a typewriter for \$285 and a small typewriter desk for \$14.95. Art Edmondson is hired as a second constable for \$5,000 per year.

January 1966 – Residents of Old Kildonan are given permission to dispose of car bodies in the Old Kildonan Nuisance Grounds on Leila Avenue

January 1966 – Council forbids power toboggan rides on the property of the Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary on McPhillips Street

January 1966 – Secretary-Treasurer Murray Cox is to be paid \$5,520 for 1966

January 1966 – Stan Eszczuk is relieved of his duties as Assistant Secretary-Treasurer

January 1966 – Chief Constable J. P. Devlin is fired after he asks for the hiring of another constable and other purchases for the Police Department. Constable Art Edmondson is appointed the Acting Chief Constable. Councillor Harry Dolinski resigns in protest at the firing of J. P. Devlin.

February 1966 – Mrs. A. McRae is to be paid \$1.50 for her work in the municipal office

February 1966 – Acting Police Chief A.C. Edmondson is to be paid \$600 per month with no overtime pay.

February 1966 – Emil Blackner is appointed the Guardian of the Nuisance Grounds

February 1966 – The General Municipal Mill Rate is set at 10.19 Mills for 1966

February 1966 – George Streilein is elected to Council

February 1966 – Metro Owchar is hired as a Police Constable at \$430 per month

February 1966 – Linda Bowack is hired as a Clerk-Typist at \$225 per month

March 1966 – Rene Defoort, Steve Tokarz and Peter Batiuk are to receive \$1.50 per hour for work done for the municipality following the March 4 blizzard

March 1966 – A grant of \$45 is given to the Victorian Order of Nurses

March 1966 – Mrs. Whiteway is appointed the Census Enumerator and Dog Licence Collector for 25% of the fees after Henry Ross refuses to do the work when council cuts the money received from the collection of dog licenses from 50% in 1965 to 25% in 1966

March 1966 – A secondary dike, 1 ¼ miles long and 7 to 9 feet high made of dirt is to be built along the Red River to hold back flood waters. The Pink Panther Copa Limited is told that the municipality cannot build a dirt dike on their property because their building is too close to the Red River. Their building can only be protected by polyethelene sheets and lumber piled against their building.

May 1966 – Jack Holland is hired as a Police Constable at a salary of \$300 per month

May 1966 – The owner of Chemic Peet Company, Landscape Gardeners on Foley west of Aikins ask for a drainage ditch south of their property

May 1966 – Council orders the garbage in the Leila Avenue Nuisance Grounds to be burned weekly by having fuel oil dumped on the garbage to eliminate rats

May 1966 – Garry D. Hannah, owner of the Stop and Sock Driving Range says the cost of erecting a fence along Red River Boulevard would cost \$1,000 and as a result he would close his business. He claims it is not necessary as he has liability insurance of \$50,000.

May 1966 – The Greater Winnipeg Gas Company is to install a gas main on John Black Avenue and Scotia Street

June 1966 – A 16 inch watermain is to be built on the east side of McPhillips Street from Canna Boulevard to Leila and a 16 inch watermain on Leila Avenue

July 1966 – Constable Holland is to be paid time and half for overtime

August 1966 – Utilityman Rene Lavigne is to receive an increase of \$25 per month

September 1966 – The Police Department is to lease a 1967 Plymouth car from Eastern Sales for \$140 per month including insurance

September 1966 – Gas mains are to be installed on Le Peress Avenue, Murray Avenue, Park Manor Boulevard and Benn Avenue

September 1966 – Council asks the Seven Oaks School Board if an auditorium could be built onto Red River School as part of the 1967 Centennial Celebrations

October 1966 – A gas main is to be built on Ridgecrest Avenue

October 1966 – Council provides a grant of \$374.95 to the Red River Community Centre for a snow blower

October 1966 – Constables J. Holland and M. Owchar are given a salary increase of \$50 per month

May 1968 – Mrs. Watt is to be paid \$1.40 per hour for her two weeks work in the municipal offices

May 1968 – Police Chief A. C. Edmondson is given the authorization to rent a pocket pager for a trial 3 month period for \$20 per month
