The reports of the retiring officers of the East Kildonan Unemployed association make interesting reading, and carry a reminder that it is exactly four years today since organization. The occasion will be fittingly marked tonight (Thursday) at 8 o'clock. The social committee has completed arrangements for a social evening in the Elmwood Labor hall. Entertainment will be provided and refreshments served. Invitations are being forwarded to all local organizations, also those affiliated to the "Manitoba Conference of Unemployed Associations."

In an introductory paragraph of a press report prepared by officials of the organization appears a reminder that "while the association has always welcomed free expression of all forms of political views on matters of importance to its members, it has successfully resisted all attempts at 'political domination' during these four trying years."

The report of the grievance committee shows that the association had succeeded in adjusting 187 cases, while the report of the treasurer showed the finances of the association to be in good order.

The social committee extended thanks to all local organizations for a year of co-operation, including St. Stephen's church, the Mothers' Social Union and the management of the Washington Ave. Mission.
