

# SUBURBAN POLICE STATIONS OPENED

North Winnipeg and Fort Rouge  
Have Their Own Precinct Offices  
---Public Invited to Inspect.

The new suburban police stations in Fort Rouge and North Winnipeg were formally opened last evening by Aid. Adams, chairman of the police commission, in company with Chief McRae of the city force.

The Fort Rouge station, which will be designated as sub-station "B" is located on the corner of Jessie avenue and Nassau street. Inspector Green is the officer in charge, and his staff consists of 17 officers and constables.

Inspector Blair has charge of the North Winnipeg station, sub-station "A," which stands second in importance to the central. It is located on the corner of Magnus avenue and Charles street, and has a complement of 41 officers and men.

The commissioner and chief made a thorough inspection of the buildings, and they expressed satisfaction with the general arrangement in each of the buildings. Aid. Adams stated that he had taken occasion to visit police stations considered in every way up-to-date in several United States and eastern Canadian cities, and he considered the general facilities for the handling of delinquents equal to the best of them.

## Citizens' Inspection Invited.

"The interior arrangements have been well thought out," said Aid. Adams. "In each of the buildings there are separate departments for men, women and boys, each building having accommodation for a total of 26 prisoners. Assignments have been made to persons speaking foreign languages at the north sub-station, and all complaints north of the subway at the C.P.R. are expected to be made in the police station in that division. In turn the prisoners will be transmitted daily, after investigation, to the central station. The police automobile will transfer prisoners from both sub-stations to the central division headquarters each morning for trial until such time as the police auto patrol, which is now on order, is delivered—I expect in about 2 months.
