

East Kildonan Teachers Get \$1,500 Basic Salary

A new salary agreement has been reached by the East Kildonan school board and its teachers, setting the basic salary at \$1,500 a year for a teacher with a first class Manitoba certificate.

Announced Friday, the agreement was signed earlier in the week by the trustees and the suburban composite No. 1 of the Manitoba Teachers' society.

A limit of 10 annual all-round increments of \$100 will replace the \$70 previously allowed elementary and junior high school teachers and the \$100 to senior high school teachers.

A sliding scale of special allowances for second and third year university study and university degrees has been substituted for the \$75 given for each completed year of study.

Here is how the new agreement will work out:

1. The teacher on the basic salary of \$1,500 can go up to a maximum of \$2,500 through the 10 annual increments. The basic rate is the same for teachers in all grades and for both men and women. (Under the old agreement, there was one basic rate for elementary grade teachers; two for junior high school [one for men and one for women]; and two for senior high school on the same principle.)

2. The allowances for completed years of university work will be: \$200 for second year; \$240 for third

year, and \$320 for fourth year. These rates are based on the number of units of study in each one-year course.

Negotiations were carried out with T. J. Williams, conciliation officer of the provincial department of labor, as chairman.

"This agreement marks a new era in our joint efforts to provide maximum teaching service to the ratepayers and to the children of East Kildonan," said T. A. McMaster, general secretary of the Manitoba Teachers' society.

Quick Police Work Recovers Stolen Car 6 Minutes After Alert

Six minutes after cruiser car constables, R.C.M.P. and suburban police had been notified of a reported stolen car, the auto was found abandoned by police on Higgins avenue.
