

## Dr. Douglas Wallace Dies in Hospital; Funeral Today

Dr. Douglas Wallace, who for some years was health officer for the suburban municipality of East Kildonan, and who during the Great War, was medical officer of the 181st battalion, died Thursday in Winnipeg General hospital at the age of 53 years.

Born at Collessie, Fifeshire, Scotland, Dr. Wallace came to Winnipeg as a boy with his parents. He graduated at the Manitoba medical college. He was practicing at Swan Lake, Man., when the Great War broke out, and he enlisted with the 181st battalion, serving overseas with it as medical officer. On returning to Winnipeg he established a practice at East Kildonan, with his residence at 549 Henderson highway.

For three years Dr. Wallace was

medical officer for the Canadian pension tribunal, and for a time he held the position of health officer for East Kildonan. He was a former chairman of East Kildonan school board, and was president of the Home and School association.

At the time of his death, Dr. Wallace was president of St. George's club. He was a member of Prince Edward Masonic lodge, and was medical officer of Court Garry, Independent Order of Foresters.

In 1918 he married Victoria L. H. Bousfield, of Winnipeg, the wedding taking place in England. He is survived by his wife, three daughters, Rosalind, C., Doreen Mary and Alice Maxwell Wallace; two brothers, Dr. Maxwell Wallace, Emerson, Man., and Robert Wallace, Niverville, Man.; and two sisters, Mrs. Campbell, wife of A. C. Campbell, Winnipeg police magistrate, and Mrs. E. V. E. Raikes, Winnipeg.

The funeral will be held Monday at 3.30 p.m. from the A. B. Gardiner funeral home to Brookside ceme-

tery.
