Four Fined In Gang Fight

Three brothers and a youth were sentenced in court Monday after a gang fight in East Kildonan early Saturday during which three people were stabbed.

In Winnipeg magistrate's court, charges of causing a disturbance were laid against Alexander John Butka, 25, of 798 Manhattan Avenue; his two brothers, Martin, 18, and Phillip, 21; and William Trossel,

18, of 296 Larsen Avenue, East Kildonan. They all pleaded guilty, and were sentenced to a fine of \$200 each or four months in jail.

During the fight between two gang sint he King Edward Park, Martin Butka was reported to have been stabbed three times in his back and once in the neck.

A 17-year-old youth was said to have been cut on the top of his head and Alexander Butka, to have a one-inch stab wound in his arm.

Winnipeg city police said that during the fight clubs and knives were used by the two gangs.

At least seven people were said to have been involved in the fight.

Police said the incident had been sparked by an argument at a restaurant in East Kildonan.

The gangs had been told to leave the restaurant and, on agreement among themselves, they met at King Edward Park.

"We're still looking for further people," Winnipeg detectives said Monday.

Collision Injures Motorcyclist

A Winnipeg boy was reported in "guarded" condition in hospital Monday night after the light motorcycle he was riding collided with a half-ton truck at the corner of Wentworth Street and Dorchester Avenue at 7:10 p.m.

Police said Larry Kisiw, 16, of 682 Jessie Avenue, was taken to Misericordia Hospital with serious head injuries, and later transferred to Winnipeg General Hospital for X-ray examination.
