

Born In Carman

Born in Carman, Man., 41 years ago, Mr. Bodie moved to the Elmwood district of Winnipeg as a boy. He moved to East Kildonan in 1944, was elected to the school board in 1946, and the next year was chairman of the board.

In the fall of 1947, he was elected reeve (changed to "mayor" by statute the next spring.)

Mr. Bodic joined the Dominion Bridge company limited in 1929 as a junior clerk in the accounting department. Today he is assistant comptroller for the construction firm's western division.

He is married and has a daughter, Brenda, 11 and a son, Douglas, seven. They live at 160 Hazeldell avenue.
