

CAIRN HONORS MEMORY OF LATE S. R. HENDERSON

Within a stone's throw of the old Pritchard farm, where he was born, a boulder cairn to the memory of the late S. R. Henderson, erected by the Manitoba Good Roads association, was dedicated last week on the grounds of the Lord Kitchener school in North Kildonan.

Ex-Mayor R. D. Waugh, president of the Manitoba Good Roads association, unveiled the cairn, which appropriately faces the Henderson Highway, the province's first improved road, and bears a bronze tablet having a bas-relief portrait of Mr. Henderson and an inscription in appreciation of his long and faithful service as president of the Manitoba Good Roads association from its inception in 1909 until his death, January 27, 1928.

Among those present were: J. B. Henderson (brother) and Mrs. R. W. Greig (sister) of Mr. Henderson, and several of his nieces and nephews,

including Miss Anna Greig, of Vancouver, and Mrs. David Jackson, of Fort William, nieces. Among old friends of Mr. Henderson present occupying a place of honor around the cairn were: Hector French, councillor of Rockwood; William Waugh, A. C. Emmett, secretary of the Manitoba Motor league; D. A. Ross, former M.L.A., and Mr. Bentley, who has been secretary of the Good Roads association since its inception.

Other speakers were: H. C. Whelams, reeve of North Kildonan; J. Fletcher Campbell, president of the Kildonan and St. Paul's Agricultural society, who told of Mr. Henderson's ardent activities in behalf of the society, and E. B. Reynolds, member of the session of John Black Memorial United church.
