## North Kildonan Canoe Club Opens in Style

The cornerstone of a tradition was laid in North Kildonan, Saturday. Kildonan Canoe club, remarkable both for the worthiness of its attainments and for the foresight of its founders, held its first annual midsummer regatta on the beautiful Red river course stretching in a gentle curve for one mile in front of the newly-erected clubhouse.

You have heard of group enthusiasm. You possibly have knowledge of enthusiasm of that nature, past or present, in this city or in others. To approximate the intensity of the enthusiasm of this new club's members and executive, you must select in your memory the absolute enthusiastic peak, and multiply.

Kildonan club members provided the largest part of the fine inaugural programme, with Winnipeg Canoe club assistance in several exhibition races.

R. O. Taylor, a past commodore of the Winnipeg Canoe club, and a dominant figure in the earlier history of that organization, officially opened the new club after a short introduction by Corb Sheppard, founder of the Kildonan club. Tom Whellams won the men's singles, in a close finish with Dave Robertson. Margaret Price triumphed in the women's singles. Des Donaldson and Bert Kooyman won the men's tandem. Joan Allan and Betty de Pencier the women's. . . . The Kildonan four-boat showed real class in a half-mile contest. . . . Jim Barrable, Jim Horne, Tom Whellams and John Tatlock were in the winning boat. . . . Wink Stevens and John McLaughlin won the gunwale race, a novelty feature. . . . the ladies' war canoe race was the most exciting of the day. . . . Johnny Smith's Winnipeg Canoe club crew nosed out Bert Orr's Kildonanites by no more than a yard. . . . Betty de Pencier won the crab race. . . . Winnipeg Canoe club men won the half-mile war canoe men's event, with Johnny Smith coxing the south-enders to victory over Ian Snider's Kildonan crew.

Reg. Bates' aquaplaning was the goods. . . . Badger Locke, Howie Masson, and Bob Cotton pleased the large crowd with a splendid hand-balancing display. . . . Speakers included Kildonan's commodore, Jim Barrable, J. R. K. Milne, J. Gallagher, reeve of North Kildonan; George Young, Winnipeg Canoe club commodore, and others. . . . Other well known local sportsmen, Buss Muth, Vic Johnson, Bert Orr, and Harold Harriman, were introduced.

## Ky. Laffoon Wins Cleveland Open Tourney

Oakwood Country Club, Cleveland, Aug. 15 (UP)—Ky Laffoon, tall, dark-skinned Chicagoan, was \$3,000 richer today because he had decided at the last minute to play in the \$10,000 Cleveland open golf tournament instead of an inter-club match at home.

Laffoon, blasting his drives and putting with uncanny accuracy, conquered the final 18 holes in 35-35-70 for a 280 aggregate on 72 holes. He sank a 40-foot putt for a birdie on the sixth, but flubbed a three-foot putt on the eighteenth "because I knew I could take two putts and still win the tournament." "Slammin'" Sammy Snead, of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., grabbed the \$1,500 second prize, with a total of 281 strokes for the four days' play. His feat of matching the course record of 67 plummeted him from fourth place.

Billy Burke, of Cleveland, aggregated 282 with a 72 for the third place and \$300.

Four stars tied for fourth and received \$487.50 each. With 72-hole totals of 285, they were: U.S. Open Champion Ralph Guldahl, of Braidburn, N.J.; E. J. Harrison, of Oak Park, Ill.; Ray Mangrum, Oakmont, Pa., and Vic Chezzi, Deal, N.J.

## Calgary Shooter Is Best

Edmonton, Aug. 15. (CP)—W. J. Muirhead, of Calgary, retained the Alberta singles trapshooting championship here Saturday by busting 197 birds out of a possible 200, a record score for the event. He set the previous mark of 196 in winning last year.

Don Blow, of Calgary, was second with 195.

Chummy Plumber, of Flin Flon, Man., with 194, and Jimmy Girgulus, of Saskatoon, with 188 trailed the leaders but were not eligible for the title.

# Kildonan Canoe Club Holds First Regatta

In the junior tandem, Marsh Haynes and Jim Mackay took a close decision from Tom Whellams and Doug Burroughs. The closest finish of the day came in the double blade tandems with Fred Gallagher and J. McKenzie winning by an eyelash from Wink Stevens and Ken McLaughlin. In the girls' tandem race Marg Price and Beth McIntosh showed a clean pair of paddles to a classy field, followed closely by Betty dePencier and Kay Wilson, with Nora Barrat and Merl Finlayson taking the show position.

The girls' crab race was finally won by Nora Barrat after much turning and twisting, which really provided a lot of fun and amusement for the spectators. Another blanket finish wound up the mixed tandem event with Betty dePencier and Dave Robertson just nosing

out Isabel Holden and Jim Barry. The main event of the day was the junior fours. The three length handicap given to the novice crew of H. Atkins, C. Pink, J. Barry and A. Zibicki proved to be too long a lead, in fact they were still about one length ahead crossing the finishing line. The first junior crew to finish were J. Horn, S. Sidloski, T. Whellams and J. Tatlock. The crew of Bud dePencier, Bill Alderson, Dave Robertson and Charles dePencier wound up in third place.

Commodore J. Barrable officiated, and Rear-Commodore Ian Snider was head man of the events.
