Parks board officials were conductibg an intensive investigation Monday in an attempt to discover identity of vandals who ran amuck Saturday evening or early

Sunday morning, uprooting plants, turning over benches and creating a general state of havoc in pic-

turesque Elmwood park, the outstanding beauty spots Winnipeg.

The damage was discovered Sunday morning, when park attendants arrived for work. More than 200 selected plants were found to have been either crushed and broken or uprooted and flung

about the grass. The vandals did a very thorough job on their mission of destruc-Not one flower bed remained intact. A complete replant-

ing scheme will have to be under-

taken by the parks board. A reward will be offered for information leading to the and conviction of the guilty parties, George Champion, superintendent

In all his experience as superintendent, Mr. Champion said, he had never seen such deliberate destruction in any of the Winnipeg parks. On occasions plants had been stolen presumably by persons
