

ATHLETIC CLUB CLOSES HOCKEY ACTIVITIES

The remarks were of great value in training, as this department of attaining physical fitness is all too often overlooked by trainers. In closing he congratulated the hockey team on their fitness and ability and on their conduct during their games. It was to their credit that they had played every game in the schedule of the ward one league of the East Kildonan community rink winning six games out of the nine games played, and losing out to the Rough Riders for the community cup by the odd game, though outscoring their robust opponents by seven goals to five on the series.
