# New \$120,000 Dormitory-'Gymatorium' Dedicated At Knowles Boys' School

The first unit in a new building programme at Knowles School for Boys — one of 28 agencies served by the Community Chest, — was dedicated Sunday afternoon before a crowd of more than 400.

The \$120,000 building has been designed as a dormitory for 45 boys.

It also contains a roomy "gymnasium," or combination gymnasium and auditorium.

The official ribbon-cutting ceremony was performed by Hon. R. F. McWilliams, lieutenant-governor.

Rev. P. V. Samson read the prayer of dedication.

Funds for the building were raised by the Rotary club of Winnipeg, in co-operation with

the Community Chest.

J. W. Tackaberry, Rotary president, presented the title-deed to C. H. Attwood, president of the school.

## Administration Building

Future building plans call for the addition of a wing to the new dormitory and construction of a central administration building.

The old dormitory will remain in use for some time, according to Mr. Attwood, due to present overcrowding.

The guests made a tour through the building following the ceremonies, and also saw model airplane demonstrations, gardening exhibitions and art samples by students.

Contributions were made by

various firms, associations and individuals to the building, including the Winnipeg Fire-fighters association, which will equip the gymnasium.

A basement locker room will be furnished by the Griffons club, while all necessary installations for the hospital room will be provided by the Manitoba Pool elevators.

## Dormitory Furnishings

One of three dormitories will be furnished by the Winnipeg Grain and Produce Clearing association. A second dormitory will be furnished by J. K. May.

Women of The "100 club" furnished the matron's suite.

Among other contributions is a food mixer, on behalf of Osler, Hammond and Nanton company.
