

Munroe School 'Open House' Friday Night

The six-room building is fully modern in the use of matching tile floors and pleasing wall color combinations, with scientifically designed desks for comfort and utility.

Chalk boards are easy on the eyes and are aided by softly diffused fluorescent lighting throughout.

Venetian blinds reflect light upwards in classes having a southern exposure. The even heat you experience in this building is created by a dust-free oil burning unit.

The exterior, buff stucco trimmed in green, makes this structure an asset to our community, held in high esteem by Miss McIntyre, principal, her staff and all the young pupils who up to a few days ago have had rather a rough time of it being crowded elsewhere.

New Junior High, Addition Planned In East Kildonan

The Board of Trustees of the City of East Kildonan once again finds itself faced with a severe shortage of classrooms. The large elementary enrollment of recent years is now entering the Junior High School, making it necessary to provide more accommodation at this level. The Board proposes to construct a school on the only available property in the district, which is the Munroe School grounds located in the southern section of the city.

Since it consists of almost 10 acres of land, this property, which now has the six-room Munroe School on it, is large enough to permit the building of a Junior High School.

The Board are also unable to accommodate the increased enrollment in the north-west area of the city and have planned a six-room addition to the existing Angus McKay School.

In addition to the present enrolment of almost 4,000 students now using 117 classrooms, the result of the Board's census of pre-school age children taken in May indicates that during the next six years over 3,300 six-year-olds will enter East Kildonan schools.

Undoubtedly this figure will be substantially increased since another two housing developments are now underway, one of which must be served by the Angus McKay School.

It is the Board's opinion that Angus McKay is the logical place to build an addition since it will relieve the crowded conditions not only in that area, but also in the Lord Wolseley School.

Construction costs for both the addition and the new Junior High School total \$390,000. A bylaw prepared for the purpose of borrowing this amount and issuing debentures must have the voter's approval at the Oct. 23rd elections before further work can proceed.

The Board points out, once again, that while it requests the approval of ratepayers for this construction, there is no intention on its part to build to the peak of the school population.

It feels, however, that in the light of present enrolment, immediate needs, and continued future increases, that a Junior High School and an Elementary School Building for the 1958 opening term is a definite necessity.

In the break-in, a hole was smashed in the roof of Top's Inn and entry gained to the

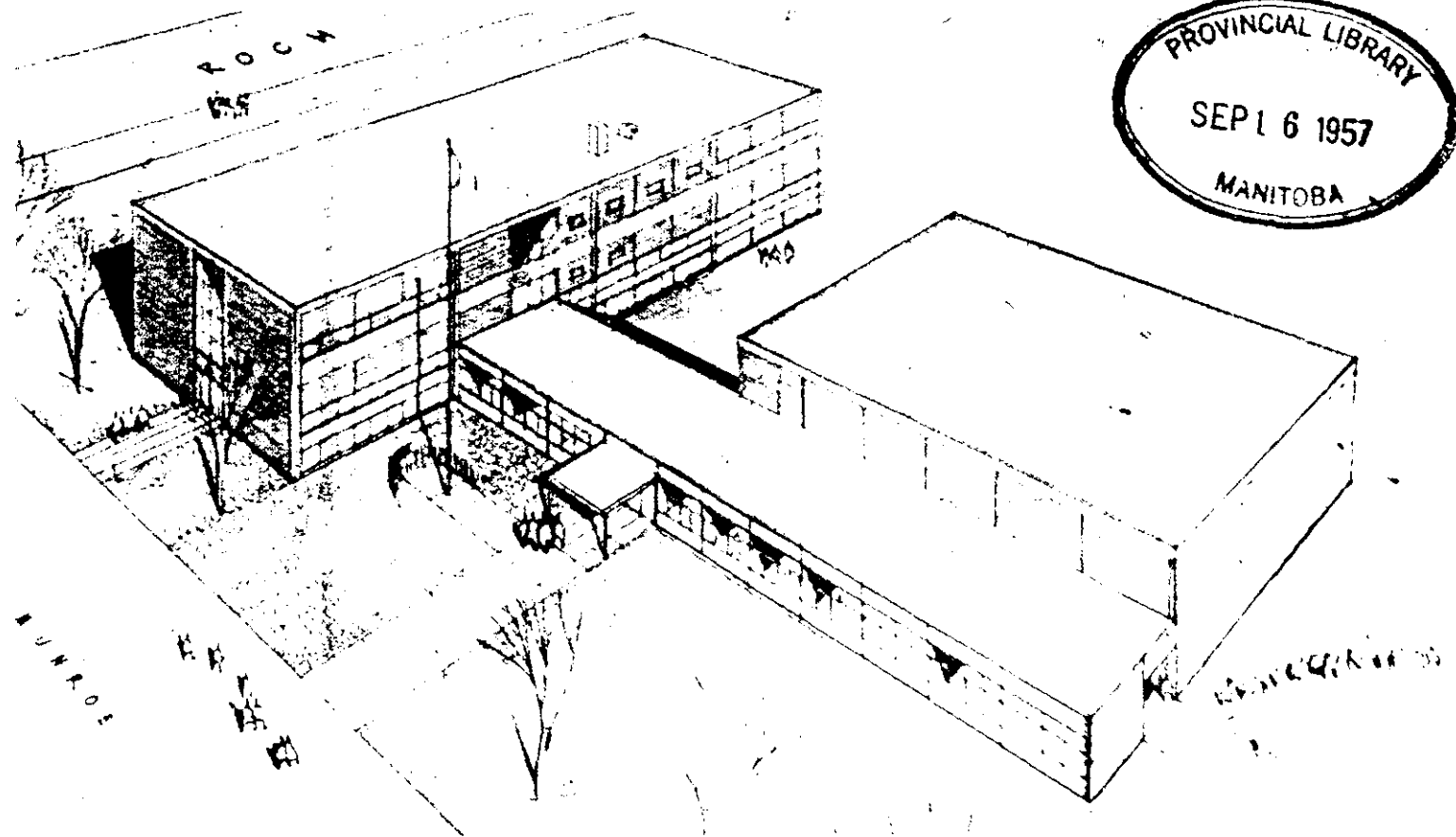

It will be located at Roch and Munroe in East Kildonan, with construction to be completed before the 1958 term opens, provided it is passed by the ratepayers. The main floor area of the school proper will feature a split-

level effect with home economics, kitchens, etc., and shops on the lower floor. Each of the two floors above will have six classrooms, a library and medical room. The glass-fronted section off the Munroe entrance accommodates office and teaching staff, with showers and changing room facilities provided for the large cement-floored gymnasium.
