The first game of the Winnipeg and District league series went to Stonewall by a 1-0 score. but Bisons came back strong in the second to even up the series with a 4-2 win.

In the deciding game, played at the Olympic rink Tuesday, 23rd ult., young Vic. Lofvendahl, in the East Kildonan nets, was outstanding in a team every member of which, down to the last alternate, played splendidly. Harmon, by reason of his strong defensive tactics, impressed, as did Cunningham, the star of the local's second line.

The first goal of the game came early in the first period to Kildonan, when Lewis picked Harmon's rebound from the back boards to lash a hard shot across the goal into the corner of the net. Bisons enjoyed an edge on play through the period, and the one-goal margin which they held until the close of the stanza was merited.

The second period was even, with neither team holding an appreciable edge.
