North Kildonan's 600 - acre vides for amalgamation of the two least populated wards into one, giving the municipality thre<del>d</del> wards. Councillors are reduced

from five to three, one each for wards 2 and 3 and two for the highly developed ward 1. The River East division lies north of Ward 1. Within its area land has been set aside for a projected inner Perimeter road, the mayor said.

North Kildənan is also entering the high rise apartment era. A start will be made during the year on its first high rise apartment, expected to be about nine storeys, and within the next three or four years there is a large commercial complex planned, the cost running to \$900,000.

Mayor Pekary sees increasing growth in the River East area because of its choice location. Lying east of Red River north of East Kildonan it is between Henderson Highway and Highway 59, both major traffic arteries, which puts the park within 10 to 15 minutes of downtown Winnipeg. It is also the closest residential district to the Whiteshell, Manitoba's eastern. playground, Mayor Pekary pointed out.

A school by law for \$462,000 provide additions to Lord Kitchener and Princess Margaret schools will go before ratepayers this spring. Under consideration is a new junior high school to provide for the escalating population.
