

Work Commenced Paving Highway

THE OFFICIAL REPORT

Subsequent to the printing on page three of this issue, of an article dealing with the paving of the Henderson Highway, further information touching on these negotiations reached our office, and we would ask our readers to read the article on page three in the light of the further information carried here, which is the official report.

The council of the municipality of East Kildonan is in receipt of definite instructions from the highway commissioner, the text of which is approximately as follows:

The municipality is authorized to go ahead with a 16-ft. pavement on the east side of the Henderson Highway from the city limits to Bronx avenue at an estimated cost of \$29,924. The municipality is further authorized to throw over the grade of the Henderson Highway, from Chelsea avenue to Rossmere avenue, in preparation for next year's paving programme at an estimated cost of \$4,941.

It is especially provided that the authorization of these works shall have no bearing on the extent to which the construction programme will be carried through, the government reserving the right to limit the extent of the programme to the funds available for that purpose. It is further provided that a wage schedule based on 40c per hour for laborers and 70c per hour for man and team be maintained.

The council, at a meeting called within an hour's notice Tuesday evening, decided that, in view of the fact that the furnishing of employment at this time was a matter of the first importance, the work be started immediately, even though a definite road programme is not settled.

Following the hurriedly-called meeting of council Tuesday night, arrangements were completed, and work started yesterday (Wednesday) morning.

The Late Mr. Andrew Wilson

It was with rather mixed feelings that many in this community learned of the passing of Mr. Andrew Wilson, of 1127 Valour Road. Deceased, who for a period of some twelve years resided in this district, had been seriously ill for several months past and the end, which was not altogether unexpected, came peacefully in the early hours of Sunday morning.

Born March 17, 1872, deceased spent his boyhood days in Canobie, Dumfriesshire, Scotland, and before coming to this country resided in Edinburgh. Thirty-five years ago he married in South Queensferry. In May, 1913, with Mrs. Wilson and daughter, he came to Winnipeg making his home on Balmoral street. The following year the family moved to Elmwood, and resided here until four years ago, when they took up residence on Valour Road.

A man of sterling qualities, deceased made numerous friends in this district. He early identified himself with the congregation of King Memorial and served on the Board of Managers and Session, being ordained to the eldership March 2, 1924. This office in the church he held at the time of his death. He also served for a number of years on the building executive of the congregation. Deceased had also been identified with the Masonic Order.

Besides his widow and daughter, Mrs. D. W. Thomson, and grandson; deceased is survived by three sisters and two brothers: Mrs. A. G. Gilmour, of Montreal; Mrs. R. Phelp and Mrs. Turnbull, of Middlesboro, and Messrs. Alex. and John, resident in Middlesboro and Ireland respectively. Suggest Paving of Henderson Highway

Reeve D. J. Allan and Councillor J. Worley Make Representations to Provincial Government — Discuss Methods Whereby Advantage Could be Taken of Dominion Government Programme to Relieve Unemployment

Reeve D. J. Allan and Councillor J. Worley, representing the municipality of East Kildonan, on Saturday conferred with the provincial government, at the request of Premier Bracken, to discuss ways and means by which advantage could be taken of the offer of the Dominion Government to assist unemployment.

The premier urged that works of provincial or national importance would be preferred to works purely local in their nature.

The local delegation urged upon the government the desirability of connecting up the present provincial system of highways with the city of Winnipeg by assisting the various municipalities concerned in improving the main approaches to the city. This point was stressed by Reeve Allan, and the delegation had specifically in mind the paving of that part of Henderson Highway running through the municipality.

Works of a more local nature, such as sewer, water, sidewalks and schools were also urged upon the government, but the difficulty in connection with any of these, as stated, was the added burden on the municipalities already over-burdened with taxes, while the highway programme would cost very little, if any, extra. The present cost of upkeep, dust-laying and maintenance would amount to almost sufficient to carry the debenture issue.

It was also urged upon the government that in any event the municipal bond issue, when floated, should carry the guarantee of the provincial government in order to take advantage of the lower rate of interest which the province could obtain.

It was further urged that in the event of any large undertaking in the city of Winnipeg, assisted by the government, the city of Winnipeg be not permitted to close her doors to workmen living in the suburbs. The premier promised that employment on any such undertaking would be thrown open to residents of Winnipeg and suburbs.
