EAST KILDONAN NAMES NEW CHIEF OF POLICE

A man with a wealth of experience as a criminal investigator stepped into the East Kildonan municipal offices Wednesday morning, determined to bring the best of modern police protection to the district.

"But a policeman is only as good as the people he works for," is Chris Einfield's favorite quotation.

With this in mind, East Kildonan's new chief of police is confident of having the most efficient force in Greater Winnipeg.

Announcement of his appointment was made Friday by Mayor Les Bodie, who said Gilbert J. Russell, Mr. Einfield's predecessor, will take over another post in the municipal set-up.

Christian Einfield, the new chief, 40 years old, is a native of Harlem, Holland, but has lived in East Kildonan practically all his life.

He came to the district at the age of four, and following an education in Salisbury, Kitchener and

Lord Selkirk schools, embarked on a career of crime investigation which was to make him a "policeman's policeman."

He is recently returned from San Francisco, where he was employed as a criminal investigator with the state attorney-general's office, and worked indirectly with the famed Kefauver crime commission in the San Francisco district.

Recalling his experiences while covering the Bay area of the city for the commission, Mr. Einfield said "Boy, it was tough."

He first entered police work as a constable with the Winnipeg police force in 1941. In 1943 he transferred to the Wartime Prices and Trade board, as a special investigator, and before leaving the organization in 1949, was assistant chief investigator of the prairie region.

He returned to East Kildonan during the spring of 1951, and until the present time was employed as a detective with a Winnipeg department store.

He takes over in the midst of a spree of break-ins, and a mysterious shooting in the municipality.

His wife, Teeny, a native East Kildonanite, and a daughter, Alison, 5, constitute the remainder of the Einfield family. They reside at 57 Linden avenue.
