

Special Meeting Called To Decide On Purchase Of Masonic Hall

The directors of East Kildonan Community Club are considering the purchase of the Masonic Hall presently located in the 200 block on Bronx Avenue. In order to arrive at a definite decision, a special meeting of directors and members is called for this evening at 8:00 o'clock in the club rooms located at Bronx Park.

This meeting is of special interest to teen-agers and the parents of teen-agers. The directors feel that the needs of this group are not being adequately met at present. Last season the teen-ager's canteen club rented the Ski Club building for Saturday social gatherings, but they found that it could only accommodate a portion of the available interested teen-agers.

The present directorate of the Community Club is rather poorly represented as far as teen-agers or their parents are concerned. This project of purchasing and moving the Masonic Hall requires the keen interest and help of this particular group. If the purchase is decided upon, it will require a special group of new directors to carry it through. The directors presently serving the club are fully occupied with its large sports program and also the raising of the necessary operating revenues which require almost \$5,000 per year.

Every teen-ager and teen-ager's parent who would like to assist in the provision of proper club rooms which are used primarily for the youth of this age group should make it a point to attend this meeting. If the Masonic Hall is purchased, it will require a great deal of alteration and renovation to use it in connection with the present Bronx bldg., and much volunteer labor will be required this fall. Help will also be needed in raising additional funds to complete the down-

purchase amount and also retire the remainder over one or two years.

The directors feel that acquisition of this building is possible and is practical providing the people in the club area want these club rooms and are willing to assist in their acquisition.

Everybody in the community has a responsibility to the teen-age youth and the directors feel that everyone is anxious to provide them with facilities in their own neighborhood. Every community club member is urged to turn out to this most important meeting on Thursday night to give intelligent assistance on this question of a club house and to lend his or her support when the final decision is made.

Housewife Thinks Juneau, Alaska Gets Bad Deal

REGINA. — (CP) — A housewife whose home is in Juneau, Alaska, thinks her adopted country is getting a bad deal.

Mrs. Edmund Hinke, whose husband has worked for an oil company in Juneau since 1946, debunked stories of Alaska's reputation as a land of ice and snow when she came here for a visit.

Mrs. Hinke said that while Juneau is isolated, she found it an interesting place to live. Social life is much the same as in any other city. There are a number of service clubs, and Mrs. Hinke is a member of the Parent-Teachers' Association.

As for the climate, she said it is mild in both winter and summer and precipitation comes mostly in the form of rain. Mrs. Hinke found the scenery around Juneau superior to that of California, her former home.
